I never cease to be amazed at coincidence. Last spring a request re Dr Clapp and wife Zella Davis was received here. It just so happened it arrived the day we were indexing a Walkerton cemetery and – you guesses it – one of the stones recorded was Dr Robt Clapp and wife. During the last weeks of Nov, Gladys Arnold forwarded R. Morden's query re Ainslie of the Owen Sound area and the Sun Times, Owen Sound, dated Sat, Dec 3 carried an article by Andrew Armitage on the Ainslie Dock at Leith. I have just recently made a copy of the Elder Family Tree for our Library and in the Vol 5 #3 issue of Relatively Speaking A.G.S., there is Charles Denney's story of the Denney Picture-Descendants of Donald Elder and Christine Campbell. Questions – Why do these coincidences happen in names other people are searching and never once happen to me???

A few notes to add to your "Book of Lists" or whatever –

HERALDRY What is a Coat of Arms?

A complete coat of Arms (correctly referred to as an achievement of arms) included the following.

- (1) The shield on which are displayed the symbols (charges)
- (2) The helm or helmet varying in style and position according to rank
- (3) The mantling originally a cloak attached to helmet to protect against heat, cold rain now adapted into a formal floral design flowing out from both sides of helmet
- (4) The Torse or wreath consisting of six bands of silk alternately of the shield colours affixed to helm to hold crest in place
- (5) The crest used for easy identification in battle
- (6) The motto originally a war cry or slogan inscribed on a scroll beneath the shield
- (7) Supporters animal or human figures appear on each side of shield lending symbolic strength
- (8) The compartment or ground on which the supporters stand often indicating a geographical feature of home area

Reminders to those searching in Great Briton. You will need a good idea of name and age when that ancestor died so that you can trace back to his birth in the General Register at St Catherine's House, also if he had a common name it helps to have his occupation if you haven't an address or exact date of death. A copy of his full birth certificate costs 4 pounds but worth it since you now have names of his parents & can send for their marriage certificate. Since St Catherine's House records only go back to 1837 you may have to go to 1841, 1851 or 1861 census or the nineteenth century Census at the Public Record Office, easier if you know where he lived! If you find him in the Census you will know his birthplace so go next to the parish registers. Some registers go back to the middle of the sixteenth century. The Society in Genealogists Library of London has a large collection of register copies. Research fees for non members are 2 pds for up to three hours Also ask for other books like Rate Books or Vestry Books. Copies of wills since 1858 are kept at Principal Probate Registry, Somerset House.

Before 1858 wills came under ecclesiastical jurisdiction and trace these through the local county record office.

From Gladys Arnold, Research Co-ordinator

The value of Tweedsmuir Histories which have had genealogical material inserted in them was brought out this summer. Mr and Mrs Jas Collins of Ohio called on me. He knew his grandfather had come from Purple Grove area which was an Irish settlement in Huron Twsp. In the Tweedsmuir Book kept by Purple Grove Women's Institute he found an obituary of his grandfather James Collins - telling birth date, marriage, parents, death, members of his family and when the family moved to Kansas. The book also told where James Collins was born and when his father, set the seeker on the right track for further research.

Cemetery recordings are also proving helpful. Mr and Mrs Armstrong of Wisconsin arrived seeking info on her grandparents – Archibald McDougall and Christine McKenzie. Their deaths are recorded in Lochalsh Cem in Huron Twnsp on Hi 86 along with data on other members of the family. This also gave her the correct area for further research. The younger members of the family had gone West before 1880. I am finding recordings of cemeteries in our area helpful in answering queries.

I was able to go to the New Registry House and peruse the original Parish records for Perth. I found my McDonald family and got copies of my great grandfather's Baptismal in 1807. It's all there and my only regret was that I had not time so will have to work through Mormon Library, Salt Lake. We even found the burial plot in the Greyfrier Cemetery of my great, great grandparents Peter and Betty McDonald. After Edinburgh we rented a car - - - - went to Kyle of Lochalsh and Isle of Skye (the McDonalds stronghold), back through Glencoe and Glen Orchy (the Fletcher castle) Glasgow, Dinwoodie Mains - part of the McDonald and Fletcher history - to England and in Topcliffe, North Yorkshire, I was able to verify family records for the Graingers. On to Birkshire where we struck gold – the Evans family has proved to be most interesting and we've only just begun. From the Sun Times Owen Sound, Mary 12, 1955

Clayton Rand in his book "Stars in Their Eyes" published to mark the 150th anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase has a biographical review of Albert Barnett Paterson. He was born on a farm at Blantyre which his grandfather homesteaded after coming from Scotland in 1842. James Paterson started a store and Feb. 1863 the Blantyre post office was established with James doubling as Postmaster. It remained in the hands of the Paterson family until it closed in 1922. The store was operated by Albert Craig Paterson, son of James and father of Bert, until he retired in 1934. Bert Paterson was born Jan 20, 1883, one of eight children of the late A. C. Paterson and Zillah Shepherdson: he went to school in the area and to a Toronto business college. In 1905 he headed south - - - and in Jan 1908 he married Miss Annie Evans Brown of Meridian, Miss. Mr Paterson went on to win many awards: the Times-Picayune loving cup in 1944; a plaque of appreciation and proclaimed Louisiana's First Citizen; a steam-electric generating station dedicated in his honor; Paterson House at Tulane Univ given his name and was called a foremost citizen by Mr Rand. Mr Paterson died in New Orleans Aug 6, 1952.

From Sun Times, Owen Sound, Mar 12, 1955

Flour Mills Fast Vanishing: the first flour mill in this district was built at Inglis Falls started by a man named Brown in 1845 and purchased by Peter Inglis who completed the construction. It was operated by the Inglis family until 1933. *

In 1846 a mill was built at Leith by Mr Telfer and in the later days of its history was operated by Thomas Kemp. It closed down about 1919. Wm Knechtel and Sons Mill at Hanover is still operating.

Other mill were built at Wiarton, Paisley, Meaford, Cargill and Chesley. The Chesley Mill stood for about 100 years and was operated by Adolph R. Henkel.

* Editor's Note – The former owner of the mill at Inglis Falls, Victor Stuart Inglis, died Mar 3, 1978, aged 85. He was the son of Wm Alex and Eugenie Wright Inglis

From Sun Times, Owen Sound, Oct 6, 1956

Park Head: Wm Simpson was first settler, coming to the area from Peterborough in 1855. The village was named by his wife after her native community in Scotland. Their son W. A. Simpson was the first white child born on the Indian land, 1857. Second settler was Edwin Spencer and after a church was established in 1867 he served as preacher and assisted Rev David Williams and those who followed. Third settler was Thos Armstrong who came in 1857. Henry Lewis moved in Jan 1859 and the first school was opened on his land in 1867. In 1862 Wm Street built a saw mill on the Sauble River. Pringle brothers, John and George settled in Keppel Twp in 1863 and David Berry came in 1864. The mill was sold in 1875 to M.S. Rourke and later to Robt Young. Later millers Ben Kocker, Wm Lawson, Harry Ross, N. H. Leonard, and Joseph Young, Harry, James and Dan Banokbank operated a Black smith and carriage shop. The first store was built by M. S. Rourke; others on the same site were John Rourke, Chas Rourke, E. G. White, and J. E. Matches.

Miss Mary Corby was the first teacher. Park Head was the scene of Canada's first rural Folk School. It was held Jan 1939 at Bert and Helen Samells with about 15 members under the direction of Mr and Mrs Leonard Harmon. As a result of this the first rural credit union was organized at Park Head Mar 1948. Officers were: pres. T. A. Pringle; Manager treasurer, W. H. Robinson; directors, Wilfred Smith, J. Johnson, Norman Smith, Herb White, N. Philp. Credit committee: Wes Matches, T.E. Evans, A. P. Radbourne; supervisory com: Mrs. A. B. Samells, Mrs. N. R. Philp, Harold Doubt.

War Service – 1st war: Milne Berry and John Pridmore made the supreme sacrifice others who enlisted were Roy Pringle, Catherine Young, Oliver Berry, Gerald Spencer, Alwin Holland, Chas Rourke, A. B. Samells, Stan Rourke, Gilbert Marshall, Herbert Farrow, Walter Caswill, Robt Calhoun, Harvey Whitmore, Gordon J. Your Canada and Mine, Madeleine Levason: On March 1st, St David's Day, Canadians of Welsh origin raise their glass and say 'lechyd Da' meaning "Happy Days". If your mother came from Aberstwyth or your Da hailed from Llangollen, Mar 1st, is the day you'll pin a leek to your lapel. The daffodil, national flower of Wales, is another symbol used Mar 1st. Those thousands of Canadians named Davison, Davis, Davy, etc. share their Welsh ancestry with other Welsh names such as Evans, Ellis, Edwards, Lloyd, Lewellyn, Owens, Powell, Price, Pritchard, Rees, Richards, Roberts, Thomas and of course, the innumerable Jones'. There were Welshman among Canada's earliest explorers, missionaries and settlers. David Thompson, the great geographer, James Evans, the missionary who invented the Cree alphabet, and many others. Once a dynasty of Welsh sea captains ruled Campobello Island in the Bay of Fundy. Man O'War House near the village of Welshpool, N.B. was the residence of the reigning princess of "Principal Proprietaries of the Great Outer Island of Passamaquoddy". From 1770 to 1881 these feudal rulers issued their own money and maintained their own militia.

Individually, Welsh settles came to Canada soon after the British conquest, either directly from Wales or through the States. A number of Welsh came from the Pennsylvania Welsh Tract to Upper Canada and established a Quaker settlement in York Co and another near London. Many of the Welsh immigrants who settled in what was then North West Territory in 1902, were descendants of a group that went to Patagonia, South American in 1865 and then to Saltcoats, Sask and these new farmers in the Canadian west filled the land with music, for when two Welshmen get together you have a choral society.

"Fall trolling is rigidly circumscribed by law; in olden days there were no such restrictions. A little incident: William went to what is known as Big Shoal, opposite Vail's Point, duck shooting. The ducks failed to materialize so William cast his fishing line overboard. The salmon trout rarely bit in a dead calm, but for some reason changed their tactics this day and when William was at last compelled to stop and go ashore, his boat was full of lake water and fish. He had long lost count of his catch but when he reached shore he found he had killed over eighty trout."

"Another local institution was the Annan Band; more correctly it might have been called an orchestra. Some time in the late sixties it seemed like Topsy, it just growed. George Henderson was secured as leader and members were as can be recollected: James Telford, clarinet; Frank Cathrae, cornet; Robt Dixon, Robt Henry and Wm Keefer, violins; Adam Waddell, ophcleide; Wm Telford, cello; Miss Agnes MacLean, organist, Adam Waddell, from Galashiels, had played the slide trombone and was assigned the ophcleide on that account. It was a large unwieldy brass instrument, resembling the modern saxophone more than any other, was played with a

cup mouthpiece and pitched in E flat. It had a strident quality of tone and this one was irreverently nicknamed 'the giraffe'.



While doing research for my family in the Prairie Prov I discovered information about Arthur Mack, b July 9, 1860 at Tara. Left Goderich in April, 1878 for Manitoba

From Jean Peart – 'Copies of certificates from St Catherine's House went up to six pounds as of Jan 1, 1978 so finding the right locality really pays off now as local Registers just charge 2.50 pounds

From J. Eric Blaney – 'Re the Irish Genealogical Research Society. The new address is 7A Duke of York Street, St James's Square, London, SW1Y 4LE, England'

From Melba Croft – 'The Borough of Etobicoke clerk has the keys for the cemetery at Islington dating from 1835. It is located on Dundas St west of Burnhamthorpe. This office has under its control the area bounded by Steele Ave on the north Lake Ontario on the south, Humber River on the east and Indian Lane and Etobicoke Creek on the west.'

From Jodi Kennedy 'I recently turned up some information in search for McCutcheon. I found the McCutcheon Trace Assoc of the States; for further information contact Ms Blanche Kobl, 953 Juniper Dr, Costa Mesa, Cal 92626 The paper is issued bi-annually and fees are \$5.00 per year.'

From Gerald Merrick – From The Irish Canadian, June 12, 1872 – Kincardine, May 12 – the story of lightning striking a house owned by Mr Keys in Kincardine Township. 'The fluid entered by the chimney, knocking out a portion of the gable, and scattering the bricks and stove pipes in all directions one portion passing through the floor and the other escaping through the open door. Two dogs, one lying by the stove and the other under the table were both killed. Mrs Keys was struck on the thigh passing down the right limb below the knee it crossed to the left and down the foot burning her severely, scorching the underclothing and stoczing (sic) and carrying away a portion of the boot. She was completely parapized for some time but is now in a fair way of recovery. Mr Keys, sitting by her side was knocked down but received no further injury. Two other members of the family were also injured.'

From Olive McLaughlin – I copied verbatim the following from Cumbria Family History Society Protestant Returns: These were rendered in 1641 and purport to include the names of all persons age 18 or over who took an oath to be 'true to God, their King and the House of Parliament' or who refused such oath. The lists cover all the parishes of Cumberland and Westmorland and, whilst not absolutely comprehensive, can serve as a starting point for this period, though one needs to regard the information as ancillary to other records.

For the Millom Mother Church, 119 names were returned and there are separate lists for Whickam and Whitbeck and, in fact, all churches in Cumberland from Bewcastle, in the north, to Thwaites in the south, and likewise for Westmorland.

SARAWAK – Grey County's smallest Township (as recorded in 1928)

When Sarawak was first incorporated it contained what is now known as Brooke or Owen Sound North, and which was at one time the Indian village of Newash. Indians surrendered the territory of Perth, Huron, Bruce and Grey excepting the portion north of a line drawn from the mouth of the Sydenham to the mouth of the Saugeen, which included Sarawak, Keppel, Eastnor, Lindsay, St Edmund's, Amabel and Albemarle. In the treaty; year 1855 this territory was surrendered, excepting small 'reserves'. The largest of these was Newash and it too was surrendered in 1857 when the Indians moved to Cape Croker in Albermarle. The township was surveyed in 1855-1857 by Chas Rankin but even before this the Ormiston, McKnaught, Monck, Huston, Gerolamy and Joseph Lundy families were there. The townships of Sarawak and Keppel and Derby were united for and election of reeve and Mr Ormiston was chosen. However this election was declared illegal by reason of insufficient number of ratepayers which was accomplished the next year and Mr Ormiston was then declared reeve of the united township whose union continues until 1868 when Mr John McKenzie became first reeve of Sarawak and Mr Charles Julyan, Sr, became first clerk. The first council composed of Scagel, Lundy, Sutton and Blatchford met in Brown's school. Reeves for subsequent years were: R. J. Doyls (1869-1873), Sam'l Redfern (1873-1874), J. A. McKenzie (1875-1876), Robt McKnaught (1879-1889), J. S. Findlay (1890-1892), W. J. Graham (1893-1896), Chas Lethbridge (1897), R. J. Doyle (1898-1899), Wm Pedwell (1900), Thos Ross (1901-1902), Robt Frost (1903), Wm Pedwell (1904-1905), Wm Roseborough (1906), Thos McLelland (1907-1909), Joshua Larter (1910-1914), Sam Agar (1915-1916), Andrew Abra (1917-1919), W. J. Saunders (1920-1922), F. McNeil (1923-1925), Jas T. Dickson (1926 - - - -

Mr J. McKenzie was clerk of the township from 1889-1907; Mr W. M. Morrison was clerk 1907-1910 Mr Wm Morton succeeded him and was serving in 1928. Mr Chas Julyan, Jr, son of the first clerk also served for thirteen years.

Wm Sutton, first white settler was born in England, came to York in 1830 and married Nah-Nee-bak-wee-quay a daughter of So-nee-goh, a Mississauga Indian chief. They came to Sarawak in 1845, received a piece of land including Lot 33, 3rd Con but the claim was disallowed in 1855 by the government and Mrs Sutton eventually went to England to carry her fight to claim the land. Mr Sutton was a councilman, soldier on the St Clair frontier and at his death was buried on Lot 33.*

Mr Joshua Larter settled in 1863 and a barn framer helped in the building of the township, including the Presquelsle Lighthouse. Others who came at that time were Kirks, Julyans, Gawleys, McLeods, McAllisters followed by Mortons, Garvies, Lees and Shermans. Under councilman C. Lethbridge, W.J. Cavell, Joshua Larter and John Goodfellw with reeve J.S. Findlay a grant was made to Grand Trunk Railway for an extension to Park Head Owen Sound branch.

Sarawak as of 1928

In 1867 Brown's and Corbett's schools were opened with Mr Chas Julyan the first secretary and his son the first teacher of Corbett and Mr Wm Saunders the first secretary of Brown's and Mr McNaran the teacher. In 1877 section 4 was created and is now the present Victoria School. The first church was Methodist. The first Post Office was on Lot 42 on Con 3 with Sandy Bell Postmaster; when it was moved to Presquelsle McKenzie became Postmaster. An office was opened at East Linton with Wm Crowe as Postmaster. It was he who named it after his native town in Scotland. Also at Presquelsle, besides the busy docks, was McKenzies' store and harness shop, Wm Hayes' wagon shop, Thos Smith's saw mill and Jas Sutherland's Elevator. And a branch of Western Telegraph Co. There was music floating across the Bay, with the band from Leith performing on the east side while that of Sarawak played on the west shore. Sarawak band consisted of John Saunders, Geo Saunders, Wm Saunders, Geo Harvey, Richard and Rowe McKenzie, Thos Howell, Wm Morris, Geo Gunn and Wm Winfield.

There were also saw and grist mills in 1863 a sawmill was built by a Mr Mallard. When it was later purchased by MR Sam Redfern a large dock was constructed. This mill was later torn down and a large chopping mill built which was destroyed by fire in 1926. There was, too, a flour and grist mill built by David Johnston. There was once a hotel at Balmy Beach, at Huston's and at Corbett's at Presquisle. One of the finest tourist hotels in Ontario was built in 1900 at

Bayview. Hydro was supplied by a dynamo and it also had a pavilion and grandstand. It has been since demolished.

Sarawak's Agricultural Society was formed in 1875 with Wm Roy its first president and Chas Jylyan Jr secretary. R. J. Doyle had a kiln for processing Portland cement. In 1903 a seventy-five acre plot was set aside for the Rockcliffe Rifle Range. It was used for rifle practice and in 1927 four regiments camped and trained here.

In 1901 the council composed of Reeve Thos Ross, councillors John Young, W. C. Griffiths, Jacob Speers and John Wilson purchased the south half of Lot 13, Con 3. They retained 10 acres for the purpose of establishing a cemetery, Mount Pleasant and sold the remainder to Wm Catto.

Property for the Owen Sound Golf and Country Club was purchased from Robt Glenn in 1920. In 1912 a large greenhouse was begun and operated for a time by W.M. Morrison and later by Geo Cutbush. Near here was the large summer home of D.M. Butchart of Owen Sound and British Columbia.

The present council for 1978 consists of Cameron Barfoot, reeve, Mrs Lois Urstadt, deputy reeve (first woman to serve), Jack Goodfellow, Gerald Cole, Wm Wilder, Councillors and Gordon Cameron, clerk.

THE RIFLE COMPANIES

Parent Units of the Grey and Simcoe Foresters

The present Grey and Simcoe Foresters Regiment stems from the Amalgamation of two County Regiments, the 31st "Grey" Battalion of Infantry and the 35th Battalion of Infantry "Simcoe Foresters". Both these units are shown in the militia list to have been organized as of General Order #14 dated September 1866.

It should be noted, however, that at least two Rifle Companies organized in 1862 were parent units of the 31st "Grey" Regiment. One of these, the Owen Sound Rifle Company became No 1 Company and the other, the Leith Rifles became No 3 Company of the newly organized "Grey" Battalion in September 1866.

Both of these Rifle Companies saw service during the Fenian Raid which occurred earlier in 1866. The Owen Sound Company served on the frontier at Sarnia from April 1st to June 22nd, 1866 as part of the Sarnia Provisional Battalion.

On June 2nd, 1866 the Leith Rifles proceeded from Leith in the Steamer Clifton to Collingwood and entrained for Toronto, arriving there about midnight the same day. Within two days they were patrolling the roads between Kingston and Toronto as part of The First

Provisional Battalion Rifles. They were later billeted in Kingston and Coburg until ordered home on June 21, 1866.

I have in my possession copies of the muster rolls of both these companies at the time of their service in the Fenian Raid. Each Company was commanded by a Captain with two other commissioned Officers, a Lieutenant and an Ensign. In addition, the establishment of each Company consisted of four Sargeants, four Corporals, two Lance Corporals and about forty-five Private Soldiers.

Of these two companies, I have more information on the Leith Rifles than the Owen Sound unit.

My paternal grandfather, the late Lt/Col James Pattison Telford V.D. was the Lieutenant of the Leith Rifles at its inception in 1862. His original commission is dated January 1863 and is signed by Lord Monck the then Governor General of British North America. My grandfather served with the unit during the Fenian Raid and was awarded the Campaign Medal and Grant of Land given to such veterans. When the Leith Rifles became No 3 Company of the 31st Grey Regiment, he commanded the Company as a Captain. He served continuously with the "31^{st"} until 1900 and commanded the Regiment from 1894 to 1900. He had continuous service in the Canadian Militia for 33 years.

As mentioned previously the Leith Rifles were organized in 1862, and headquarters was at Dunedin as Annan was called at that time. A drill shed was erected here and the unit paraded for training once a week.

A unique ceremony in the history of the Leith Rifles took place on March 22nd 1867. On that date "Colors" were presented to the Company. This silk banner had been sewn the previous winter by the ladies of the district. The ceremony was held in the open air on the Green in front of the Annan Schoolhouse. The Company was drawn up at attention and the presentation address was read by Mrs Peter Taylor. A reply was given by Captain James P. Telford and Miss Campbell then formally presented the colors to the keeping of the Company. Reverend Robert Dewar offered an appropriate prayer.

Following the ceremony, the Officers and men of the Company with their invited guests, to the number of ninety, sat down to a sumptuous repast at VanWyck's Hotel.

The Leith Rifles continued at Annan as No 3 Company, 31st Grey Regiment until 1892, when the Company Headquarters was moved to Owen Sound. Leith had been until this time the only rural community in Grey County from which a Company was recruited for the "31^{st"}.

In the late 1940's the "Old Colors" of 1867 came to light again. I had inherited a quantity of documents and other military material from my grandfather, and while rummaging through an old trunk, I came on the old colors. They were somewhat tattered by the years, and wrapped in old newspaper.

We have since donated this relic of the Old Company to the Grey and Simcoe Foresters. They have had it suitably mounted in a glass case, and in hangs in a place of Honour in the Regimental Headquarters Armoury in Owen Sound. Truly a link between the present Regiment and its forbearers on 1862.



A bugle presented to a division of the regiment in 1886 was used to sound the advance. Past president T. M. Armstrong is the Adjutant Captain.

Meeting Notes

June Meeting at Markdale, June 27, 1978 – Representatives of the Library Boards, Ms B. Sweezey and Ms Kitty Pope spoke of references and resources in the local Libraries. Mrs Earl (Ruth) Hunt showed slides and told of acquiring a grant to use towards the restoration of Cochrane Cemetery, located on the outskirts of Mount Forest. The first burial here was 1852. Some of the names – Bennett, Best, Brown, Fergusson, Gilberts, Jepson, McKellar, Allan, Holtom, Lambert, McPhee, McGillivray. This is an ongoing work to be continued next summer. Mrs Breakwell asked that queries re the Markdale area can be sent to The Markdale Library where a group of interested people will attempt to help researchers.

July Meeting at Scone, July 25th – A well attended, delicious pot-luck supper under the 'spreading Maple trees' followed by a meeting in the Hall, once Scone School. Tom Armstrong, past pres, conducted the business and then the local members introduced us to methods of dating old photos. Using the style of the era as a guide it can often be determined when the

photo was taken. Types of pictures and methods of preserving these were presented. Visitors from a distance (Toronto, London, Michigan) were welcomed.

August Meeting, Aug 22nd at Clarksburg, Gerald Merrick presiding. It was reported that our secretary, Mrs Lundy had been instructed to send a letter to the Owen Sound Sun Times telling of the Branch's regret at their having deleted obituary columns. From Gordon Irwin, 30 Eton Dr, Kitchener, N2B 1P1 – I have been doing the Irwin family tree. In Oct 8/58, I started by writing close relatives. But I could never find out where my great grandparents came from and no one knew except from Ireland. I wrote many a letter to Register House, Dublin, Ireland. After 8 years of writing, a lady in the Register House wrote on her own to say 'I have traced your grt grdprts marriage certificate, so send me five pounds and I will forward it to you' Now I have traced the Irwin family back to Irwin, which is now known as Irvin, Ayrshire, Scot. - - - - In 1759 they went to Tyrone area. I found it hard to trace into N. Ireland as before 1868 there were no records kept. In 1976 we decided to visit Ireland and before we left home a letter came saying 'I am Mel Martin and my ggm and yours were sisters' We were invited to their home and - - - attended a church service in the church where my ggm was married April 8, 1846 before coming to Canada. We were the first Irwins to go back to the ancestral home in 131 years.

From W. Spicer, R. R. #6, Pembroke, Ont K8A 6W7 – 'from a clipping given by Mrs Ernie (Mary Spicer) Hamilton – News of the terrible tragedy which occurred near Winona, N. D. on the 18th, in which five persons were brutally murdered, created a sensation here, as a brother of John and Thomas Spicer has lived here for the last five years - - - Richard Spicer says that Rev Thomas Spicer, born in England, settled in Canada near Toronto. He was taught the trade of Blacksmith, his father's trade and married Miss Waldron of Egerton, Ont. He then settled in Dundalk, Ont. Five years ago Thomas Spice went to North Dakota and opened up a blacksmith shop near Winona. This he sold to his older brother John, who established there. He bought a farm and became a local Methodist preacher. The father of the Winona victim is a resident of a country place in Ontario and the address is as follows John Spicer, Robb P.O., Ontario'

Mr Spicer says from recollections of the account told him by Robert Amos Spicer it went like this – Three Indian men had been to "Whiskey Fort" and had come away with too much of the white man's poison. They stopped at Uncle Tom's farm and tried to buy his team. When Tom refused to sell an argument sprang up and Tom was murdered and as well his wife, twin girl's and the wife of Tom's brother, John. The Indians were detained in the local jail and when John and his

railroad section crew returned, John learned his wife had scratched the face of one Indian. John advised the jailer to bring the Indians forth and spying one with a scratched face proceeded to kill him with his bare hands. The other two were dispatched with frontier justice. Mr Spicer would like to hear from anyone with additions, alterations, or educated guesses about the Spicer family to communicate with him or Mary Haskill, 289 Seventh St. Midland, Ont.

Unique Family Reunion at Earls Barton – A unique reunion took place at the weekend of the family who have been Lords of the Manor at Earls Barton since the 16th century. Seventy members of the Whitworth family, all related to Admiral Sir William Whitworth, present Lord of the manor, met for a luncheon at the Hind Hotel, Wellingborough. And afterwards they went to see Brigadier Dysart Whitworth open an Earls Barton Village Exhibition, which is part of the Church's Millennium Program. The exhibition itself contains over 100 exhibits and photographs, including relics of the Stone Age, Saxon times and right through to the present day. Also on show were the Church records dating back to 1558. And exhibits relating to lace making and shoe making in the village. During the afternoon the Festival Coffee Pot a tea and coffee room run by Guides in a flat above a shop was opened to the public. In the evening there was the inaugural meeting of the Poetry and Literature Festival, when the novelist Mr Alan White talked about "Work in

Our September meeting will be in Kincardine on the 26th and we thought you might like to know

About the Salt Industry — 'All that remains of an industry which many years ago provided employment for nearly three score people in Kincardine and provided a superior quality of salt for homes across Canada is a rusty iron pipe from which gushes continually a cold stream of water' (This information came from Owen Sound Sun Times 4 May, 1945, and was saved for us by Betty Warrilow) Salt was mined by having brine pumped from below the surface. Two companies were involved, Kincardine Salt Prospecting and Manufacturing Co and the Bruce Salt Company. In 1867 Bruce Co had offered \$1000.00 as a bonus to the driller who would sink a well to 1000 feet to discover salt and the money was divided between Southampton drillers \$400 and Kincardine \$600 since the mineral was found here. Both the afore mentioned companies were unable to continue and the plants were closed in the seventies. However Wm Grey of Philadelphia came to build an extensive plant costing \$75,000 and Levi Rightmeyer of Quaker faith also from Pennsylvania put a second plant into operation.

As has been said, the brine was pumped up to the plants, where it was boiled and the residue, or rock crystals were taken out, dried and packed. At first iron kettles were used but were replaced by flat pans, known as grainers, which could be brought to a boil quicker and thus

made finer salt at a cheaper cost. In time grainers were replaced by vacuum pans which speeded the evaporation process, which in turn were replaced by the use of steam. At first wood was used for fuel and then as it became scarce coal was used. Coal had to be shipped in and then, of course, production costs went up, even though it was possible to prepare and complete for shipment 50 tons of salt daily, ranging from packaged fine salt to the blocks found in most pastures. The Levi Rightmeyer plant continued in operation until 1891. The Gray plant, one of the most modern of the time, was bought by Ontario Peoples' Salt Manufacturing Co, manager John Tolmie, then sold to Valley Camp Coal Co and was acquired by the Canadian industries in 1936. Then like a bolt out of the blue, the plant was closed, machine dismantled, buildings wrecked and only that iron pipe with its gush of water remained. Another of the small town industries which have faded from the scene over a period of years. Written by J. W. MacLeod for the Sun Times.

Kincardine and area -

Some of its outstanding citizens have been –

Sir Alexander Mackenzie of Brazilian Traction; Col Hugh Clark; Hon James Malcolm; Lt Col W. Eric Harris, military inventor and Canadian playwright; Alistair Murry; W. Harold Rea, of Canadian Oil Companies Ltd.

At one of his press interviews, Mr Rea spoke of Kincardine and his youth there. He was the son of a flour miller, who lost his mill to fire in the first World War years and moved to Port Colborne. During the years Rea lived in Kincardine he earned money by trapping the mink and muskrats which were plentiful in the area at the time. He recalls having seen four and three masted schooners in the harbour, the ships used to carry lumber up and down the Great Lakes. They held a reunion the year before Harold Rea was born and its native sons returned by boat. However, shipping declined after that and Kincardine was no longer an important port. By the time the 1926 reunion was held former residents came by special train. Later they travelled into the community by car or plane. Rea joined Canadian Oil Companies in 1933 and became President in 1949. This company purchased the property at Oil Springs and has developed it as an international historic site, commemorating the birthplace of North America's oil industry. Here an oil well was in operation as early as 1857.

Kincardine Winter - - 1851 by L. N. Bronson (from Bruce Co Hist Soc Year Book 1870) excerpts from a letter written by William Fraser) – 'Mr Bridgland, the surveyor, gives the Township a very high character and no doubt it will soon all be taken up - - - - Three lines of Free Grants are run through it toward the interior from the lake, and all settled - - - There is an impression that winter is very hard in this place but this is a mistake, snow came last season on the 7th of December, and on the 26 of February it was almost all away out in the clearings - - - As to the village of Penetangore - - - its progress has been singularly rapid. The first shanty is only standing two years and now there are five merchants, 3 taverns, 2 saw mills, several other houses, a chapel (only begun) and in a few days a grist mill coming as well as a distillery. I feel a little amused when I hear continually of Queen Street, Princess's Street, Albert Street, Park Street, etc., whilst only a few houses are seen. But this arises from a mile and a quarter of a Town Plot having been laid out with great care and expence by a Government surveyor - - - Boats are regularly

running almost every other day in summer between this place and Goderich, taking passengers for three York shillings and we expect a steamboat this season. We have a Common School, but for the meantime we are without a teacher and no Doctor within a range of 40 miles. - - - The weather is very fine just now and the wild onions are out about an inch, and cattle beginning to refuse to come home at night so we expect a favorable spring and sailing craft on the lake before the end of next week'.

Church of England, Kincardine by Mrs Edgar Rowe (from Bruce Co Hist Soc Year Book 1973) The deeds – Part of the land by patent of the Crown dated Mar 29, 1865: a Tax deed Co of Huron dated Feb 20th, 1872; still another deed dated April 20, 1874. A church was erected in 1858 with Wm Browning and Wm Rastall as wardens. Planks were used as seats - - There was at that time only one pew with a door which the beadle used. His name was Joseph Abell, an Englishman. - - In 1867 an 860 pound bell was purchased and installed in 1868 - - - .

In 1972 it was realized that the church needed repairs. The bell tower was unsafe. Willing workers came forward. It was a time of anxiety for the workers and for the spectators. - - - The volunteer workers often changed according to the different working hours. Finally the tower was down. The 860 pound bell - - - will be placed on the east side of the church. Plaque on the inside of the church commemorates the work of the early members. On a stand is a large Memorial Book in which names are inscribed in Old English by Clifford Kempson. - - - especially remembered by me is the name Alfred Abell - - - The son who succeeded his father adhered to the English custom of tolling the bell when a member died. When King Geo V died the church bell was tolled the day of the funeral. To do that Alfred Abell stood in the bell tower on a day of freezing temperature. The bell had to be tolled by hand three times at a time, and then after a pause the tolling was repeated until the total number of years lived had been reached.

The Generations Come and Go by William R. Millar (also from Year Book 1973) Excerpts from this - 'My grandfather never tired of telling me about his father coming to Canada from Scotland in 1821. The came by boat to Prescott: from there he took a stage coach to Lanark and settled in Dalhousie Township. Here my grandfather was born in 1825 - - - - - After some 35 years - - the family migrated to Huron Co. During the trek - - - they met a Smith family making the same journey - - - before the journey was over three Smith brothers married three Millar sisters. - - -Michael remained in Huron while William, my grandfather, went on to locate in Bruce Co. - - -Lot 59 on the south side of the Durham Road in the Township of Kincardine - - - received a free grant of 50 acres from the Crown and became a pioneer settler in 1850, - - - other lots to the west were bought and a cheese factory was built on one. - - - soon enterprising farmers started mutual cheese factory near Bervie. - - - The Penetangore creek ran across the back of the lots -- - Grandfather and his wife - Margaret Rawlston from Perth, Ont - joined other pioneers and built the first Presbyterian Church on a quarter-acre lot sold by John and Mary McKinney to the church for five shillings. - - - In the 1860's my grandfather had his grandfather come from Scotland to visit him at his Bervie farm. While here a sickness became fatal, and he was buried in a small cemetery on the Durham Road at 60 side road. - - - Grandmother had ten children, seven boys and three girls - - - My father was Matthew Virtue Millar, the youngest. He remained on the farm until 1912. Grandfather died in 1910. Grandmother had predeceased him by 12 years and both are buried in Kincardine Cemetery.

She arrived in Blanshard Township near London, Ont, along with her sisters Janet, Mary and Margaret and her brothers David and Robt. Elizabeth m Robt Irvine. In 1883 they, with eight children, the eldest of whom married Geo Bere, moved to Kincardine. They bought two farms on #9 Hiway near Millarton. Elizabeth d 1912, Robt d 1913.

The children of Robert Irvine and Elizabeth McCullough – Elizabeth m Geo Bere; Agnes m Robert Robinson; Jessie m Archie Shewfelt; Mary m Frank Brown; Annie m Wm Anderson; Jane Niven (Jennie) m Angus McCallum; David m Stella Worthy (1), Martha Robinson (2); William m Myrtle Anderson. (Jessie Irvine's husband Archie Shewfelt came from Manitoba to visit his sister, Katherine, married to Sam Avery, mother of Bob Avery. So it seems 'Go West' was a two-way street. So many of our families in Bruce and Grey have family ties in the West. Editor's Note)



THE GARAFAXA ROAD

First surveyed by Rankin in 1837, then by John McDonald in 1840-41, began at Fergus extended through Mount Forest, Durham and Chatsworth to Owen Sound and was the route by which settlers came north from Guelph. As early as 1857 parts of it had been gravelled and it is now part of our Highway system. It is called No 6 by us but known as the Garafraxie by my grandpa!

THE SAUGEEN INDIAN PENINSULA

In 1827 the Counties of Bruce, Grey, Huron and Perth formed part of what was known as the Western District and at that time was surrendered by the Indians, with the exception of the lands lying north of a line drawn from the mouth of the Saugeen east to the mouth of the Sydenham at what is now Owen Sound. This was then known as the Saugeen Indian Peninsula. A 'half-mile strip' along the south of the Peninsula was later set aside with the understanding that the government build a road to run from Owen Sound to Southampton.

In 1855 Lord Bury, Superintendant of Indian Affairs, was sent to negotiate a treaty with the Indians to obtain the land. Since Lord Bury was at Owen Sound and the Indians were camped on the mouth of the Saugeen and since the road was not even chopped through until 1865, there was considerable traffic forth and back between messengers or 'runners'. Finally an agreement was reached to meet and hold 'council' at a point approximately half way between the two 'chiefs'. They met on the Sauble River at what is now Allenford and a treaty was made for the surrender of the Peninsula, except for some small areas reserved for the Indian. The largest of these was the Township of Sarawak (surrendered in 1857) another being Chief's Point still Indian Land, though some is leased to cottage owners. At one time it was the meeting place or council place of Indians of the area and we understand such things are arrow heads, wampum beads, skinning stones, etc, have been found here. At present just on Indian is living on this reserve.

In 1855 Charles Rankin was instructed to begin the survey of the two most southern townships, Keppel and Amabel and in 1856 over 100,000 acres of land was sold at an auction, most of it to speculators and so just a few settlers came in at this time. David Forsyth was already living near Elsinore and it is understood his children were the first white babies born in Amabel. This township was incorporated in 1861 and was united with Albermarle for nine years. For municipal

purposes it had been united with Arran from 1856 to 1860. Some of the first settlers in Amabel were Forsyth, Allen, Kribs, Howe, Porter, Burwash, Simpson, Griffith, Knox, Greig, Paton, Thompson, Horne, Wood, Atkinson. There were also Reids, Davidsons, MacDonalds, Kidds, Armstrongs, Lewis', Streets, Berrys, Rourkes – the list goes on.

Albermarle with the townships to the north withdrew from Amabel in 1870. Their first municipal officers are listed as Thos Lee, Ludwig Spragge, Richard Crane, Samson Pettman, Alex Craig and clerk John Shackleton. In 1878 St. Edumunds, Lindsay and Eastnor withdrew from Albermarle with council being David Scott, Frank Waters, William Freeman, Joseph Waugh, James Elden * and clerk C.W.W. Dalton. Many of the names from the Peninsula are preserved into the third and fourth generation. Elsinore – the first post office in Amabel, Donald McLeod, postmaster. The first church in the area was Presbyterian. The first school was on the Forsyth farm in 1863, teacher Mr Burr; the second school was built 1864.

Hepworth – Wm Spencer, who owned 200 acres just west of where the village now stands, built a small log building and opened the first stopping place on the corners and so established the Village. Others in early were William Wilson, William Moffatt, William Plows (who started the second hotel), Briggs, and Driffil both had stores, both lost to fire. The post office was opened in 1870, Spencer, postmaster. Jas Atchison built a blacksmith business in 1884.

Oliphant and the Islands – It is said the old Fort on Main Station Is, built by Capt Alexander MacGregor, was constructed about 1836.

Elder???

He is credited with turning the fishing industry into a commercial enterprise. The first post office at Oliphant was at John Hutchison's in 1875. He carried the mail from Wiarton to Oliphant and Sauble, first on foot and then by horse. The first school opened in 1876, built from material rafted from the mill at Sauble Falls (McLeans); first teacher received 180 dollars per year. First trustees were Matthias Johnson, Wm McCutcheon, and John Hutchison. Wm Eyer was the builder. Our thanks to Mrs Hyatt from whom this information was obtained. Present at the laying of the corner stone of the first church in 1899 were Messers Bowman, M.L.A.; D. M. Jermyn, Warden; J. R. Chambers, Reeve; J. E. Campbell, reeve; Cecil Swale, councillor; Meth minister Rev Kitching. This church was used by three denominations with Rev Kitching, Methodist, Rev Atchison, Presbyterian, and Rev Henderson, Anglican; as ministers. Some early settlers in the Oliphant area were David Cook; Jos Bellmore; Matthew Renshaw; Dan Renshaw; Wm McDonald; Wm Mason; as well as Alderson, Vance, Moore, Cox, Glendillen, Randle, Abercrombie, and those mentioned earlier

Wiarton – laid out as a town plot when the peninsula was first surveyed and put on the market 12 years later. The first settler in the town limits was James Lennox; B. B. Miller was the Indian Land Agent and ran the first tavern; the first store was kept by Mr Dinsmore. Also a dept'y reeve of Amabel. The town was inaugurated in 1880 with the following officers David Dinsmore, Jas McKim, D. G. Miller, J. W. Jermyn, Hiram Brown, with clerk T. D. Galloway, treas, Neil McMillan.

Oxenden – in 1847 there were three men here – Gleason, McKenzie and Cameron.

Colpoy Bay – following Wm Bull came Alex Greig, Wm Paton, F. Thompson, Andrew Horne, John Wood and Samuel Atkinson, then Kribbs, Spragg and Stringer. By 1880 Bell, Brown, Cates, Cross, Soper, Whicher, Wright.

Lion's Head – surveyed in 1856 by J. Stoughton Dennis when the Township of Eastnor was surveyed, inaugurated as a village in 1917. Mr Warder in his book 'Between You and me and the Gatepost' lists the following – 1868 Nathaniel Tackaberry; 1869 Richard Tackaberry; Geo Moore; 1873 James Simpson, Edward Barley, Francis Waters, David Scott, Sr; 1875 Michael Morris, 1876 Charles Webster, Sr; 1877 William Stewart; John Everatt; 1878 Thomas Boyle; 1883 Thomas Bruin; Henry Brooks was among the early arrivals but we have no exact date. Both Tackaberry and Geo Moore claim to be the first settler in Eastnor Township. In 1875 Frank Stuart erected a log building for post office and store. Charles Webster came from Scotland; wm Stewart from Perth Co with his wife Sarah Waite; Chas Williams came from Wales and the Bruins came from England. Alex Chisolm came to the area from Inverness, Scot and Wentworth Co. John Alexander Ganton joined Chisolm in the general store business. R E Moore came to Lion's Head from Vandusen and Moore at Tara in 1883 and joined Rob Watt who was here earlier. Mr Warder also mentions Pedwell; Haskins; Forbes; Tigerts; McKays; Menarys; Sensabaugh and others.

Tobermory and the Township of St Edmund – first settler Charles Earle and Abraham Davis from Collingwood in 1872. In 1875 John Shearer, Jacob Belrose, Michael Belrose; in 1876 James Seaman from Owen Sound; in 1877 Donald McDonald, who had been light house keeper on Cove Is; in 1878 Geo Pepper. Tobermory was laid out as the town plot of Bury, named as so many places were, for Lord Bury and his friends and family.

That area of the Indian Peninsula within the County of Bruce composes 216.64 square miles and is now more familiarly known as THE BRUCE

THE ANNUAL BRUCE REUNION AT VANCOUVER

Founded in 1904, The Bruce County Old Boys and Girls Association held an annual picnic in Stanley Park and in 1951 celebrated with its 56th such gathering. While clipping 1951 papers, Betty Warrilow came across the following account, written by Cameron Stockhand for the Sun Times. 'Presiding over the gathering and acting as chairman at the speech-making program that followed the picnic was 86-year-old Dan ALTON, formerly of Lucknow, who has been president of the association for the past ten years. Now retired, Mr Alton was formerly a C.P.R. bridge and building expert. He came to Vancouver in 1890 – only four years after the city was founded.

Past president, after serving four consecutive years in office, is R. J. MITCHELL, who left Ripley in Bruce County in 1899. Still active in business, Mr Mitchell is president of a large wholesale supply firm. Plumbing and Heating Supply Ltd in Vancouver.

First vice-president and secretary is F. HAMILTON, formerly of Lucknow. H. MITCHELL who came from Ripley, is treasurer. Directors are John GARBUTT and Dr R. J. McMILLAN, both from Tiverton, R.J. Mitchell of Ripley and Dr M. SPARROW, a native of Paisley.

On the ladies' social committee are Mrs A. GUNN and Mrs S. McCARTNEY both from Underwood, Miss O. NELSON from Lucknow and Mrs N.S. STANGMEND from Glammis.

Registered at the picnic was Walter HAMILTON, who left Kincardine in 1898 to join the Klondike gold rush.

Assisting him at the registration desk was George MILLAR, formerly of Kincardine. His father, William Millar was one of the original settlers when the 'Queen's Bush' was thrown open to pioneers. His son the George Millar at the picnic, left his Bruce County home to come west in 1899. He was secretary of the Vancouver School Board for many years but is now retired.

'This is a wonderful picnic today', he said, but added sadly that it was small compared to the Bruce County picnics of years ago. 'We've got perhaps 150 people here, but there were times when we could easily count on five or six hundred. One year we had more than 750.' It was a wonderful day and a wonderful setting - - - a glade surrounded by mighty cedar and fir trees, the dense forest and heavy British Columbia undergrowth will remind many of the picknickers of the Bruce County forests. - - - -

After all the hollow spots had been filled, the president Mr Alton welcomed the Bruce County people and their guests and out lined the winter program of dances and get-togethers. Mr Alton then introduced Rev Dr. James W. MELVIN, DD, a native of Teeswater. Dr Melvin left Teeswater in 1899 for Manitoba, where he served the church for many years. He also spent four years in Lethbridge, Alta., before coming to Vancouver in 1932. Until his retirement five years ago, Dr Melvin was associated with Crosby and Trinity United Churches here. In his brief address, Dr Melvin described the recent meetings of the Canadian Citizenship League in Ottawa, which he attended as British Columbia delegate.

The final speaker was Dr J. L. MacDOUGALL, M.D. Liberal member for Vancouver-Burrard constituency and a native son of Tiverton.

Dr MacDougall told his audience that after the closing of the House sessions at Ottawa he had visited his home county of Bruce on his journey back to Vancouver.

'I have travelled widely and have seen much, but I have come to the conclusion that there is nowhere on earth that has been so greatly endowed by God's great bounty as the wonderful old County of Bruce'. Dr MacDougall's statement was acclaimed with loud and sustained applause.

He stressed the important role that Bruce County people had played in opening up the West and aiding to establish its greatness.

'It is a fact', Dr MacDougall said, 'that at one time in the early history of the old Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, 88 per cent of all the men engaged in building bridges, doing other heavy construction work were men from Bruce and Grey Counties'. The M.P. explained that they were specially selected for these important tasks in the new railway because of their ability as axemen, their familiarity with tools, their capacity for sustained hard work, and he said, above all for their strength of character.

He said that there was a 'solidarity of friendship' among Bruce County folk that could not be found anywhere else. He cited the annual Bruce picnic as well as others in Canadian and United States cities where ex-Bruce County People made their homes.

The following is a review of **PETER FULLER'S DIARY**, submitted by member Marian Casselman, and part of the Frank Harding Collection.

At the Centennial Celebration of Christ Church, Meaford, in 1969 Peter Fuller was singled out for special honour as one of the original founders, at the time of the laying the corner-stone it was he who wrote an account of the Church's early history and at the ceremony inserted the documents being preserved. Not only had the church had his support from its earliest beginnings, it was his skill as a carpenter that went into its actual construction, the designing and construction of the pews and communion rail.

The Peter Fuller Diary not only records these memories for the people of Meaford it contains jottings of events and daily life there in the 1850's and 60's. Emigrants coming on as far as Georgian Bay in Grey County had to have their possessions arrive by schooner. Those of the Fuller family came all the way from Picton on Lake Ontario, where they first settled, by water and took five weeks to arrive.

Freight could arrive by water but the further acquiring of supplies in the 1850's meant walking the seventy or so miles to Barrie, then by stage to Toronto.

Later the first month of their arrival Peter recorded -

Oct 19, 1852 The first day got to Cripps Tavern at 6 in evening, very rough day

Oct 20 Up early, ate cakes and water, walked 14 miles to Wellings Corner to dinner.

Got to Connors Tavern 15 miles by 5 for supper.

Oct 21 Up at 6 and walked to Smith's Tavern for breakfast. Walked till sundown to

reach Barrie to Mark's Hotel, to bed at 10.

Oct 22 Up at 5 and left Barrie by Stage for Bradford \$1. Noon at Bradford, left

directly on stage for Toronto and arrived there hungry and tired without a

meal all day. Put up a Baker's Hotel.

On return trip arranged with a farmer for goods 'about 15 cwt in all' to be taken as far as Bradford. From there travelled with goods aboard the Beaver to Barrie and walked back to Meaford. The entries for all three days refer to terrible roads, wetness and weariness. For one breakfast 'got a boil fowl with warm potatoes, milk and bread, walked 11 miles by noon, reached Meaford at 5. Thus concluding my first journey to Toronto and back'.

The second trip to Toronto was made for mill castings. The journey started, presumably by boat to present day Wasaga Beach, 'in the morning rowed up the Nottawasaga to Willow Creek, but missed the branch which runs to the portage had to camp out. The mosquitoes being without number, the heat oppressive and the work hard a most miserable day. Then a thunderstorm came up an obliged us to draw our boat ashore and turn it over for shelter. Reached Barrie by wagon, on to Bradford (on Holland river) by boat, travelled by cars (?) to Toronto.' Travel was eased by 1858 when trains 'pushed' north as far as Collingwood. Schooners and steamers arriving to transport local wheat, lumber and bricks kept up prosperous activity at the wharf which was further enlivened by the excursion groups starting for Penetanguishene and Owen Sound or the local cricket team starting out for a return match. As roads improved Bay traffic dropped off by 1868 the trip to Owen Sound could be made by buggy in three hours! Peter recounted walking there in 1863.

Peter Fuller experienced all these changes and went on to serve Meaford in many responsible positions as a member of the Volunteer Militia, as school trustee, manager of the first bank and in 1880 as Town Clerk. We are endebted to Mr Frank Harding for preserving these Diary Extracts.


