Families and Farms

Chapter Twelve

The families who founded and maintained the farms have been the backbone of the Township of Bruce. The stories of these people are closely linked to the land they cleared and cultivated. Because many longtime families were associated with hamlets, or lived at various places within the

Township, the Directors set criteria to include as many as possible of those who have contributed to the life of our community. All families who have lived either one hundred years or have had members of four generations residing in Bruce Township were welcomed to submit their stories.

Where the present branches are descendants of one common ancestor who lived in our Township, several stories may have been combined to produce the account presented here. Where the first generation here had more than one branch (eg. two brothers, sister and brother), they have been treated separately. Our standard in any period of one hundred years, so some of these families may since have moved from the Township. We considered four generation, descended through either "side" of a family; where a woman married into another family, the reference is given for following her descendants under her married name. Where a man married a woman whose family is included, his wife's maiden name is given in capitals.

In tracing the succeeding generations, the line of anyone who left Bruce Township was dropped only those who remained (or whose branches have returned) have been carried to the present generation.

Those properties which were designated "Century Farm" in 1967 have, of course, been included. Under a program of the Junior Farmers during Canada's Centennial year, farms which had remained in the ownership of direct descendants and were still occupied by them qualified for the Century Farm designation. There were eighteen such farms in Bruce Townships; their stories are here in some detail.

In the majority of these accounts, people have been of more importance than the property they owned or lived on; although we have tried to state locations accurately, every property occupied by an extensive family may not be included.

Many of these families have much more detailed genealogical information than our space permitted; for others, this was their first venture into such research. It is the directors' hope that these accounts will encourage more people to look into their roots, and to record the tales of their ancestors.

----- HOW PURPLE VALLEY GOT ITS NAME (sent to us by Daisy Watts)

To those unfamiliar with the history of Purple Valley, it makes sense to believe that maybe the community got its name from the lilacs, that grows in abundance in the area. In a storey last week this was suggested.

However, Gladys Klemmer of Hanover informs us that this couldn't be farther from the truth. In the early 1800's her grandfather, Chas. Watchorn purchased some land from the Crown, right across from where the general store stands now. The early settlers to the community were very dedicated Orangemen with the colors of the Lodge being orange and purple.

Mr. Watchorn had thought of naming the community Orange Valley, but there was already a community with that name. Therefore he called the place PURPLE VALLEY

I wish to apologize to Norma BYRNES for trying to change the spelling of her name. Her query is #14, page 19. I misspelled it in an earlier newsletter & persisted again even when Gladys had alerted me to my error. While the correcting fluid dries, I thought you might enjoy reading about name problems here in Grey & Bruce.

BAUX

Aaron Box and Elizabeth Wilkinson Box came to Canada from Yorkshire, England and settled in Reach, Ontario. Aaron died in 1880 and his wife Elizabeth in 1883.

They had eight children as follows: Aaron, Charles, William and George, Elizabeth (Mrs. Wm. Atkinson), Amelia (Mrs. Geo. Harper), Sally (Mrs. Jake Sutcliffe), Harriet (Mrs. Lyle New Year)

George Box was born in 1844 in Reach, Ontario, and came to the Tara area around 1863. He farmed on Concession 11, Arran for one year, then went to Con. 7, Arran. While there he married Susanna Trelford, daughter of John and Elizabeth Trelford of Con. 7, Arran. Susanna was born at Mono Mills, Ontario, in 1847.

George and Susanna had nine children as follows:

Coplen (Cope) (b. 1871) married Catherine (Kate) Morrow (b. 1875). They had two daughters: Elizabeth (Bessie) married Norman Bailey, Tara, and Dorothy married Wesley Reaburn, Chesley.

William – married Christena Berry of Kenilworth, Ont.; they had three sons; Lorne, Earl and (Dr.) Gordon; and three daughters; Kathleen (Mrs. Roy Maxwell), Sara (Mrs. Jos. Scarrow) and Ada (Mrs. Thos. Middleton).

Mervyn – married Dora Hunt, Allenford, Ont; they had one son (Trelford) and one daughter, Audrey (Mrs. Allen Almonde).

Elizabeth – Mrs. Angus McLeod

Emma – Mrs. O.W. Randall

Bertha – Mrs. Isaac Norris

Ada – Mrs. Bert Coleman

Sara Ann – died at age 9

Martha Jane – Mrs. Dave Ross, later Mrs. Harry Cole

During the time that Lizzie and Emma were attending school at Arkwright, a certain teacher, Mr. King, persuaded the girls to change the name Box to Baux, as he maintained that the former was much too plain. So from that time on the family used the new spelling, although Grandpa George never changed from the original.

Mrs. Christian Schildroth had been speaking of her parents, particularly of her mother.

"What was your mother's maiden name?" we asked casually.

"Minnie (Wilhelmina) McClevis", she said and swiftly jotted it down. The name was familiar: we'd seen it in local papers and anyway we were confident that we could spell at least well enough to get by on common terms and on names in our own neighbourhood. We had even felt a bit smug because for years we have known exactly how to spell "Schildroth" thought it is pronounced Shelltrough. We were quite confident now.

But Mrs. Schildroth's youthful and pretty daughter-in-law, Mrs. Charles Schildroth, sitting beside us, noted our scratching and kindly told us that the spelling was "Marklewitz" We were wrong in every letter and a bit incredulous and we still can't make it fit the pronunciation "McClevis". Can you?

Came to Sullivan

Mrs. Schildroth's own girlhood name was Augusta Pollusky and different members of the family spell the surname according to individual taste, so that we waive the responsibility there.

MRS. JAMES SHEWELL CAME TO DISTRICT AS A CHILD OF TWO, HAS 80th BIRTHDAY FROM THE OWEN SOUND SUN TIMES
8 Jan. 1938 (edited for the news letter)

She was born in King Township in York County, near Toronto in 1857 but when two years old moved with her parents to Euphrasia Township in Grey (Euphrasia was the third township in the county to be surveyed, between 1835 and 1840, but it was nearly 20 years later before much land was cleared). When Mrs. Sewell & her parents arrived (she was Lydia Pistil) the township was almost solid virgin forest with scattered settlers' clearings. Her father died suddenly soon after and later her mother married Richard Stormell.

During the six days of the week Mr. Stormell devoted to clearing the land with the patient oxen and on the Sabbath he held services in the log shanties of the pioneers. Besides the spiritual benefits of the early services, the church meetings were the only social assemblies of the first settlers. Following the service mail would be distributed by whoever had been able to visit the neighbouring village or town. Births and marriages were registered.

Mrs. Sewell recalled clearly Mr. Robert Dunlop, who also assisted in holding community services. Mr. Dunlop was clerk of the township for 30 years.

In the early days Indians in their bark wigwams lived in Euphrasia.

Before the advent of the grist mill, the Euphrasia settlers had to convey their grain long distances, usually to Meaford by Ox team and thence by boat to Cape Rich, where a man, named Carson, operated a mill. The barter system was in use exclusively and for payment for grinding the wheat usually one fifth of the weight was charged. The early mills used the stone grinding system and the product was coarse. If smut was prevalent the flour would be dark, resembling shoe polish, but it was consumed by the settlers and their families. It was in the early 60's that Messrs. Purdy and Walling erected the first flour mill, using the power of the Beaver River. The first saw mill was built at the same time on lot 30, concession 10, a few miles from Mrs. Sewell's old home.

Those were the days when the settlers co-operated in everything – logging and stoning of the land and weaving, soap-making and other bees in the home.

Her marriage to James Sewell took place in 1875 after which they created a home on the townline of Euphrasia and Artemesia. He died in 1931.

Her 80 descendents consist of 7 children, 38 grandchildren and 35 great grandchildren.

EARLY WALKERTON PIONEER PASSES MRS. LOUIS SCHWEGLER

WALKERTON, June 1, 1936 – The recent death in Exeter of Mrs. Anne Madelaine Schwegler, widow of the late Louis Schwegler, removes one of the earliest settlers of Walkerton. The deceased was born in 1859 in Walkerton & later married Louis Schwegler, a local veteran of the Northwest Rebellion of 1885 but who dropped dead at the military camp at London. His was the first military funeral held in Walkerton.

The late Mrs. Schwegler whose maiden name was Anne Madelaine Bacon, was the second daughter of the late Henry Bacon who came to Walkerton with Joseph Walker, founder of the town. Upon the death of her husband 50 years ago, Mrs. Schwegler remained in town to live with her family of three small children who now survive.

“In the 19th century many hundreds of people left Tiree for new homes in Canada.

Pictures with the article show – “threshing corn in about 1895, Tiree men of the tenth concession, Kincardine Township, Bruce County, Ontario & Mrs. Coll MacDougall (nee Ann Clark) who was born at Ruaig, Tiree, on May 21, 1814, and died in Bruce County on August 22, 1906. She married her husband who she married on February 4, 1835, and was the grandmother of Coll MacDougall, Tiverton, Ontario . . .”

Dr. Mackay found the main areas of Tiree settlement were in Grey and Bruce counties, fourth and fifth concessions of Osprey with its centre McIntyres' Corners: the concession south of the Durham Road in Glenelg, Artemesia and Egremont Townships, Bunessan (between Priceville and Durham) is the name of a village in Ross of Mull so Mull settlers area also found in this area and both Mull and Tiree stones can be found in the Rocky Saugeen cemetery; north part of Kincardine Township and the south part of Bruce Township.

An earlier settlement was found in Brock Township, west of Manilla. This settlement of the 1820's & 1830's was often the stopping off place for the 1850 settlers before coming to Grey & Bruce & later to Manitoba.

Wallace Dean, Lion's Head, introduced us to his grandmother's story THE LIFE OF AN ENGLISH SCHOOL GIRL.

Edward Parsons was a prosperous farmer at Walton Grounds, Oxfordshire, England. The repeal of the Corn Laws brought hardship and poor prospects for a future in Agriculture. The Parson sons decided to come to Canada. Charlotte Edmunds, Edwards wife was deceased so Edward decided to come to Canada as well. Elizabeth Marie Parsons was 20 years old, engaged to be married. She decided to break her engagement rather than be left by her family.

The Parsons had tickets to go to the West but a chance meeting with a M.P. from Brampton area at Union Station, Toronto led the elder Parson to cancel the trip west and settle at Brampton.

Two years after arriving in Canada Elizabeth Marie Parsons married Walter Dickin on 14 November 1882. Following their marriage they lived at Milton where Walter died in 1896. Mrs. Dickin took in boarders to help raise her family. In 1902 she moved to Owen Sound where her son Wallace Dickin had located. Her book of memories of her life in England was written at age 80.

Wallace & Evelyn have visited the places mentioned in the story. One thing they noted between visits – names on the grave stones are quickly becoming unreadable.

At LAMLASH we had a chance to visit the heart of Bentinck Twp. with our host Willard Krauter. The following article written by his mother gives us an insight into this township's history.

LOUISE SCHOOL SECTION IN BENTINCK TOWNSHIP HAS INTERESTING HISTORY

The Daily Sun-Times, Owen Sound, 18 Mar. 1939

Record of Events From Time School Was Built in 1870 Until 1886 Shows That the Progress Was Steady and the Community Prosperous – Many Amusing Happenings are Referred to in Article Prepared Recently.

(By Agnes Krauter, Elmwood) School section No. 8 Bentinck, or Louise school as it is called is on the 13th concession, 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ miles east from the County Highway. You turn off the highway 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ miles north of Elmwood. The section is decidedly hilly and in some parts stony. The question is often asked why did the settlers choose such stony, hilly land. Being covered by leaves the stones weren't seen and the Old Country people were used to hills and had been advised to look for farms with plenty of water close by and water is easily found in this section in the form of spring creeks and lakes.

Among the first settlers in the section were Hasties, Wilsons, Greens and Cromars. These families came around 1857 and were soon followed by others. The land to the east, north south and west of the section was taken up before the land at the school corner was settled. In 1869 a family by the name of Holler came from near Hanover and settled on lot 12, at the west side of the section. Louis Holler of Hanover tells of going to school with his sister through the swamp next their farm and having to part the bushes as they went along, as there was no road at that time through the swamp. The road went behind their buildings across the next two farms and crossed the sideroad at the foot of the hill between G. Hatie's and P. Krauter's farms. The road continued on through the next farm and came out across the road from Wilsons' mill now the Weirmier farm. The was called the Bush Road as the surveyed road went through three swamps and at that time wasn't solid enough to team on in the winter. Traces of the old road may still be seen in the bush.

As an example of German industry, Mr. Holler and his oldest sons who were expert axemen, in 7 years cleared 60 acres of land and built a frame barn the first in the locality. It is now having its 3rd roof put on. Sam Owens, Jr., was the first to take up land at the school corner. His home was on the 6th con. and he was an able axeman. To win a bet he and a friend one day split 76 cords of wood, the blocks were to be set on end for them.

First Called Copptown

Joseph Copp from Woodstock came next, and the place was named Copptown a name it retained until we had a post office. The Copp family made the journey from Woodstock a distance of 100 miles in four days and a half. A team brought their possessions and Geo. Copp a lad of 12 years and his brother, walked and drove 4 cattle, ahead of them, 2 cows and 2 young cattle. It would have been wiser to have sold their cattle at Woodstock, and bought others here as theirs didn't know enough to browse and they had to buy hay at \$20 a ton from a man at Crawford to feed them.

Thos Cross from Woodstock was the next to settle at the corner and in 1870 a half acre of land was purchased from him for the sum of five dollars to build a school on. Mr. Cross, who was an Englishman, had been teaching in Oxford County and on quitting that profession only lacked 6 months of being eligible for a pension. Unfortunately he was unaware of the pension until it was too late. After Mr. Cross quit teaching he kept a post office where he lived. He was very musical, played the violin and was organist in the English church at Woodstock. He was a quiet man, very intelligent, fond of flowers and of studying astronomy. He used to compound pills which he sold to the settlers, until the work became too hard for him. Many a pill the writer has swallowed and they weren't sugar-coated either. He lived to be over 80 years of age and never had a doctor in his life nor yet when he died, a man without an enemy. James Birch was paid \$10 to chop the half acre of land and James Wilson was paid \$109.34 for building the school. William Grant received \$58 for furnishing the wooden benches and teacher's desk which was a plain unpainted sloped desk with a lid which lifted up and revealed a roomy interior for storing books etc. There were painted wooden blackboards and a large box-stove which each year required from 10 to 15 cords of 2 ft.

wood costing from 36 2-3 cents to 79 cents a cord. The school was used for Sunday School and for election purposed; \$2 was paid for municipal elections and for parliamentary elections various sums were paid, \$2, \$3, \$3.90 and \$4. being paid. 1872 was the first year an election was mentioned.

Plenty of Whiskey

There was an abundance of whiskey on hand on election days. Going to school was rather exciting as Con. Oosters remembers when he was a young boy going to school with older boys, at the bend on the sideroad they saw a bear. The older boys put him in the centre and all made record time going the remainder of the distance to school. One day a deer came up to the school door and seeing the bright tin dipper in the tin pail at the door grabbed the dipper and made off with it. This incident is told by an ex-pupil. Boy No. 1 had a facial disfigurement which was a hindrance to his speech. The teacher at the time was very particular about the kind of language used on the school grounds. Boy No. 2, trying to appear virtuous after the noon recess jumped up and told the teacher that boy No. 1 had been swearing. At that boy No. 3 up and said that boy No. 2 had been mocking him, whereat the teacher said more shame to the mocker who was severely punished but boy No. 1 got off with a reprimand. The children would have a gay time playing hide and seek among the stumps in the yard as it wasn't until 1882, twelve years after the school was built that Sam Owens was paid \$25 for stumping, stoning, and levelling the yard. In the year 1880 Peter Knechtel built a saw mill across the corner from the school and after that it was hopeless to try to keep school after the noon whistle blew. In 1883 the mill was sold to Conrad Stadelbauer. The piles of logs in the mill yard made a splendid screen for the numerous fist-fights indulged in by the larger boys attending school. The fights which school bell cut short were finished after 4 o'clock. In spite of the dangerous practice of racing over the high piles of logs and the searching for gum, on the logs, none of the boys and girls were ever seriously hurt. The drinking water was got at a spring across the road. It was customary at the annual school meeting to make a motion and take a vote on raising the school expenses by a tax on the property. The census of the section was taken yearly, often by the secretary for which the sum of \$2 was paid. In 1870 the income was \$100, \$90 government grant and \$10 from school fund. In 1876 the assessment was \$16,810 and the school levy 26 mills. In 1880 the assessment was \$24,830 and the levy 15 mills, the next year the figures jumped to \$36,875. The new mill at the corner no doubt helped to boost the figures. In 1879 the total population of the section was 192 and the number of children between the ages of 5 and 16 years was 72. The large number of school children is accounted for partly by the number of men employed at the mills. There were three, in the mile and a quarter block across from the school and they were owned by Ferguson, Wilson and Stadelbauer and employed from 8 to 10 men each and cut from 12,000 to 14,000 feet of lumber each, a day. Children's ages at school ranged all the way from 4 years to full-grown boys and girls. There was an agitation at one time to start a hotel at the school corner but better judgement prevailed and it wasn't built. When the mill-hands had to walk five miles for their beverage they thought twice about it.

The first trustees in the school were S.B. Wilson, Peter Cromar and James Brander and it was customary to pay some person to go to Hanover to get the school monies.

In 1872, maps costing ten dollars were bought and 37½ cents or 3 York shillings was paid for shovelling the snow off the school roof. It was done yearly for several years.

In 1873, the ten commandments, and a brass bell were bought. The bell cost 75 cents. Non-resident pupils paid 12½ cents a month in advance.

In 1874, the school was insured for \$200, costing \$3, and in the same year David Hastie was paid \$31 for the teacher's board.

In 1878, \$7.20 interest was received for money loaned to some person.

In 1876, James Brander was paid \$4 for making 4 new benches, and \$10 was paid to dig a ditch in the yard, 17 rds, 1 yard long, 3 feet wide and 2 feet deep to be filled in with stones from the yard. The trustees used to visit the school to hear the pupils at their lessons, and in 1876, they visited the school in July, November and December and gave Miss Carroll great praise for her zeal in teaching the pupils. In 1884, Wm. Plaskett was paid \$40 to put up a high board fence around

three sides of the yard. In 1880, 20 school desks were bought for \$77.50 and a note for three months given in payment. Hy Pratt who had a fine team of horses was paid \$2 to bring the seats from Walkerton a distance of 17 miles.

In 1855, Mrs. Tom Plaskett was paid \$9 to whitewash and clean the school and light the fire for a year.

Mrs. Wm. Morrison an educated Scotch lady taught her eldest children and some of the neighbours at her home on the 10 concession before the school started. In 1886 a meeting was held to decide about building a new school. Nine voted for and four against. After a discussion a vote was taken and 10 voted for a frame school and 19 for a stone school. The sum of \$500 was to be raised by debentures to run 5 years. The interest was \$40, \$24, \$18, \$12, and \$6. The three trustees who were R. Laidlaw, James Nichol and Sam Owens were to go together to Hanover to get plans and specifications and advertise the same. On their way to Hanover they were to inspect the two schools on the 6th concession. The assessment of the section the year the school was built was \$83,510 and the children from 5 to 21 years was 92 and from 7 to 13 was 41. The name of the contractor was Julius Kemke and one of the masons had fought in the Crimea War. In 1877 the Inspector was Mr. Ferguson and the names of the teachers are R.R. Coutts, 1871: R. Edwards, 1872; Thos. Leonard, 1874, who was a lay Methodist preacher; Margaret Carroll, 1875, who was afterwards Mrs. T. R. Hastie; J. Smith, 1878; Wm. Campbell, 1879, who for several days around the full of the moon was different to usual and taught the children rather odd things at school. He soon was his normal self again and things went on as usual. He lived to be an old man and tended flowers and lawns for people in a nearby town. John McGillivray, 1880, who became a M.D.; Stephen E. Brown, 1881; Wm. E. Gorshine, 1882; Mary J. Trotter, 1883, who was later Mrs. (Dr.) Wm. Morrison; Jessie Milne, 1883, who is now the wife of Inspector Morrison. Salaries ranged from \$220 to \$370. The secretary's names are S.B. Wilson, James Brander, Peter Cromar, Wm. Morrison, Robt. Laidlaw, Thos. Cross was secretary in 1879, a position he held (with the exception of a few years when John Leeson filled the office) until the year 1907. Up until the year 1885 the secretaries received no salary and they changed office frequently. In 1885 they received the sum of two dollars and were paid from then on. The names of the families who lived in the section or sent their children to the log school are: Robt. Laidlaw, Morrison, Turner, Lloyd, Cook. Plaskett, Kaufman, Supernault, Coutts, Lemke, Hamilton, Geisel, Kelleher, McKay, Holler, Pratt, Owens, Cross, Craig, Bamford, Stadelbauer, Burgess, Rephkoﬀ, Wilson, Seirllian, Nichol, Green, Milne, Gremmen, Feusom, Cronin, Grant, Brander, Schuttler, Cotter, Sullivan, Last, Duncan, Birch, Copp.

HANOVER MAN CELEBRATES 94th BIRTHDAY FRIDAY

Mr. George Metzger, Grandfather of Present Mayor, Is Old Citizen of Hanover – 1936

HANOVER, Jan 26 – George Metzger, Hanover's oldest citizen, and, grandfather of Mayor A. J. Metzger of Hanover, celebrated his 94th birthday on Friday. Mr. Metzger not only is Hanover's oldest citizen but has lived in this section longer than any other man. He was only a lad of three years when his parents brought him and a younger brother, a year and a half old, to this section. They came from the United States in a caravan, with other families, up to the Queen's Bush, following the trail from Durham to what is now Hanover, and then going on to Carrick township, where they took up substantial blocks of land. Mr. Metzger's father was killed in felling a tree, and the lad then lived with relatives in Kitchener for a time, but returned to this section when thirteen years of age, and has remained here since, some 81 years. He, with his brother and a gang of six other men, had the contract of cutting the trees and building roadways all through the district between Ayton and Carlsruhe. In 1867 he was married to Margaret Feick who passed away some fifteen years ago. They had a family of eleven children, all of whom are living. Mr. Metzger lives in town with his daughter, Mrs. John Russwurm. The other children are: John (the oldest, Adam, Mrs. E. Goetz, Valentine of Hanover, Mrs. C. Manto and Mrs. H. Weber of Stratford, George and Andrew of Didsbury, Alta; Otto and Mrs. C. Russwurm of Carlsruhe, Ont.

MRS. D. McKINNON NEARS 89th YEAR

Well Known Resident Will Be 88 in June Next – 1936

Paisley, Feb 7 – Mrs. Donald McKinnon, an old and highly esteemed citizen of Paisley, will celebrate her 88th birthday in June next being born on June 24, 1846, in Bentinck Township, County of Grey, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Dougall McCallum who came from Islay, Scotland in the year 1846.

Six of the family were born in Scotland and three in Canada and Mrs. McKinnon is the only surviving member of the family today. On March 3, 1889 she was united in marriage to Donald McKinnon, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus McKinnon, who came with his parents when seven years of age from the Isle of Mull, Scotland, and settled on lot 14 in the 13th concession of Bruce Township and helped clear the land which was virgin forest at that time and lived on the same farm all his life. She was a staunch Presbyterian and a great worker in the church in her younger days and was always ready to help and assist any one who was ill. LESSONS FROM THE 1871 CENSUS

Are you aware that there are 2 copies of microfilm for 1871? One has the nominal return of the living only. The other has 9 schedules as listed below (Copied by Alfreda Veenstra)

1. Nominal return of the living.
2. Nominal return of the deaths within the last twelve months.
3. Return of public institutions, real estate, vehicles and implements.
4. Return of cultivated land, of field products and of plants and fruits.
5. Livestock, animal products, home-made fabrics and furs.
6. Return of industrial establishments.
7. Return of products of the forest.
8. Return of shipping and fisheries.
9. Return of mineral products.

The Hillman Catalogue of Census Returns on Microfilm states, "Users of the 1871 census records should be aware that it is possible to relate information in schedules 3,4,5,7,8 and 9 directly to the nominal return (schedule 1). " The first column of each page lists the page & line to refer back to in the Nominal return of the living, schedule 1.

If you live in the Grey Bruce area, the microfilm with the 9 schedules as listed above is available at the Bruce County Museum, Southampton. (Be sure to phone ahead for a reader). The Owen Sound Library has the microfilm with the Nominal return for the living (Schedule 1) only, which is also poor in many sections. This resulted in having to ask Eileen Jackson & Betty Siegrist to redo, check and in some cases copy the whole division. This happened with Kinloss – Ken Young & Tom Murray spent 2 hours before deciding the task was impossible. The film was so bad that even the onlookers couldn't help. Another example was Lindsay & Bury, listed as having only 5 families

were David McBeth, Duncan Morrison, Abraham Davis, John Hahn, Abraham West, we think. Some of the children's names could not be deciphered at either place.

How many recognized BURY as a Bruce County Township? Named for Bury St Edmunds, the Bury part was dropped and in 1881 the census is under St. Edmunds.

Because there are so many ways of recording religions, Public Archives of Canada has standardized them into a 2 letter code. In the computer print-outs only the codes will be used. However, I have been asked to list some of the denominations found in the 1871 census. This was the period before branches of the Methodist Church united so all 5 of their churches are found – Bible Christian, Episcopal Methodist, New Connexion Methodist, Primitive Methodist, Wesleyan Methodist. Also an I. Meth. E.? in Kinloss, M.B.E. – British Methodist Episcopal in Owen Sound.

The following is part of the preliminary list of religions found in the census, excluding the above: Atheist, Baptist, Bible Believer, Brethren, Christian, Christian Brethren, C.C. Baptist (Christian Conference Baptist), Church of England – C.of E. or English Church, Church of Ireland, Congregationalist, Disciples or Church of Christ Disciples, Episcopal, Evangelical, Free Kirk, Free Church, Free Presbyterian, Free Will Baptist, Close Communion Baptist, Latter Day Saints, Lutheran, Evangelical Lutheran, Mennonite, Protestant, Presbyterian, C. Presb. (Canada Presbyterian), Puritan, Quaker, Friends, Reformed Baptist, Roman Catholic – R.C. or Catholic, Swedenborgian (found in village of Kincardine) New Jerusalem, Tunker, United Brethren, Union Baptist, United Presbyterian, N.R. – no religion.

It was interesting to note that many of one religion settled together in an area. In some cases one noted the wife and children had the same church affiliation as the rest of the community where the husband has a different religion listed. It has been interesting speculating on the reason.

It is recommended when checking a census to read at least part of the division covered by the census taker to become used to his writing, his spelling (especially if looking for a Mac., in 1871 they are Mc's) & his abbreviations. This also gives a check on the neighbours – their names, & place of origin. It might be the clue needed to find your ancestor's previous home area. The month the census take called in the 1871 census can be calculated by checking against a household with a child under one year. Also remember that nominal returns list everyone in the census for a household on the day the census taker called. This sometimes resulted in a family member being missed or in another household. These people or those with a different surname from the head of the household are being listed in the O.G.S. 1871 census project as "strays". It will be to our advantage to take advantage of the computer print-outs from Public Archives of Canada when they are ready.

The following people have copied 108,092 names from the 1871 census for Grey & Bruce Counties (The rate varied I'm sure but 100 people seemed to be our maximum copying speed.) (Rate is per hour.)

According to AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY OF COLLINGWOOD TOWNSHIP on p. 207, "The first school in Germany was built in 1895 and the teacher was Malcolm Smith from Collingwood In 1898 there were 19 children in attendance, including 10 Dobsons, 4 Mitchells (from lot 7, concession 11), 3 McIlfratricks, 1 Conklin and 1 Rorke".

In this history the communities of Redwing, Rockhaven and Germany are listed together. Germany is described as "a community of woods and scattered farms usually defined as lots 1 to 6 in the tenth and eleventh concessions

In 1871 much of Germany was owned by the estate of a Captain Clarke and there was no record of anyone living in the area. Some of the early settlers all in concession 10, were Abraham and William Moore, south half lot 5, 1872 Thomas McIlfraterick, north half lot 5, in the 1880's. . . "

To date no McIlfratrick/McIlfraterick has been found for the obit. collection.
