AGNES BOWES HALL

Among the earliest settlers to come to the Pinkerton area was a young Scotsman by the name of William Bowes. His wife was Arah Bradley Bowes. They made their home on a farm just outside Pinkerton, how the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Earnie Donnelly.

Mr. Bowes, who had formerly been a man of means, had received a college education and was a qualified teacher. He was also a man of a wide variety of interests and a great reader. His family were always surrounded by a great diversity of books and magazines and encouraged to improve their minds. There were seven children in their family the youngest of whom was Agnes.

Agnes was born in August of 1868. She was a child of so pleasant a disposition that her sister later commented she was always like a ray of sunlight, and as she grew older she developed a sparkling personality and ready wit. She attended Pinkerton Public School, Walkerton High School and Toronto Normal School, and for a time after taught on the second of Elderslie. One bitterly cold and stormy night, during her teaching years in Elderslie she and a girlfriend were coming to her home for the weekend. Jack Black, her friend's escort, brought them as far as Ellengowan and Tom Brown, Agnes's escort, drove them the rest of the way. When her father began to reprimand her rather sharply for having brought her young man out on such a night and for him and his horse to have to return the long way back while she was in her warm home, she laughingly answer, "Oh, don't worry, Father, at Ellengowan the Black turned to Brown."

Turning from teaching elementary school, Agnes attended and graduated from the Blish School of Elocution. Following graduation she taught elocution in Hamilton Ladies College, and also Lutherville Seminary in Baltimore Maryland. In 1893 she went on to Little Rock, Arkansas, as a dramatic teacher in the Thorpe-Hall Academy. During these years she was very much in demand for her readings and recitations. She was, indeed a master of elocution. On many occasions where she had a few numbers in a concert, the encores would double these numbers. Miss Bowes returned more than once to the Normal School to participate in the Closing Exercises. She also appeared in Guelph, Hamilton, Baltimore, Tars, Tiverton, Kincardine, Port Elgin and many other local points, and was invited again and again. Because of her tremendous versatility she was able to present readings in Scotish dialect, in the southern drawl of Tennessee or in good king's English, showing amazing facility of adaptation, in each case. Whether the readings or recitations were heavy or light, serious or humourous her presentation was so natural and so commanding as to have the audience completely captivated. Everywhere her reviews were enthusiastic and commending.

On August 4, 1896 she was married to R.C. Hall, the inspector of schools in Little Rock. Agnes did not go back to teaching but she was very active in other ways. Over the years she was president of the Y.M.C.A., and active member of the Edelweiss Club, the Women's City Club, and also the Aesthetic Club. She was a member of the Methodist Church and active in Church and Mission work.

For many years she coached High School plays and was a popular after dinner speaker. During the war years she presented entertainment for the troops at Fort Pike.

As well in these years Agnes wrote many short stories that were well received. The first novel that she wrote, after devoting years in painstaking labour, was accidentally burned when the manuscript was just ready for the publishers. Though bitterly disappointed she went on, true to her cheerful and optimistic nature to write a second novel. This one she entitled "Craigie". It was published in 1914. This book is of interest to us, because, while at no point does Agnes pinpoint the setting, we can readily recognize Craigie and being Cargill, Gowan as Pinkerton, Gillies Point as Port Elgin, and Carnoustie as Southampton, also Greenock Swamp is part of the setting. The personalities are so well drawn as to be recognized as local men and women of that time. When she speaks of the Graigie cattle she make reference to their short horns but one knows she is referring to the renowned Cargill Shorthorn herd. The all-night checker games are taken from real life, as well as some of the anecdotes she cleverly weaves into the story.

In the manner of the day in which it was written – her book is in lengthy description and in folksy style. To quote a critic of October 1914, a few months after her book came out – "she tells a

clean, pure, enthralling story of people who actually live and love, and attempt and achieve something worthwhile in the world."

In 1915 Agnes returned to Bruce County and spent the month of July with her sister, Mrs. Hanbidge, in Arran township. When she went back to Little Rock, she particularly noted the garden parties, cherry and berry picking and checker games as the outstanding points of her visit.

She died in June of 1932, at the age of 63, after an illness of only two hours. There were three sons and a daughter in her family, and at the time of her death five grandchildren.

THE POLITICS AND Government

During the early 1840s there was no local government north from Garafraxa Township to Owen Sound, a large piece of geography usually lumped under the title "Owen's Sound Settlement". For municipal purposes, this area was included under the Wellington District, comprising what later was divided into the three Counties of Waterloo, Wellington and Grey.

In February, 1847, at the Wellington District Council meeting held in the Guelph Court House, the only delegate from any of the townships in Grey County was John Frost representing Sydenham Township. The District's Superintendent of Education reported for that year "no returns from the Township of Peel nor the other townships extending northward there from towards Derby and Sydenham on the Owen Sound Road." (Wellington District Council Minute Books).

However, in elections held in late 1847, in Glenelg and the neighbouring townships, Archibald Hunter was chosen as District Councillor from Glenelg. This first foray in responsible government was not particularly auspicious. At the first meeting of the new Council for 1848, it was moved "that in consequence of Mr. Archibald Hunter who was returned as District Councillor for the Township of Glenelg not having taken the oaths required by the Act within the term specified, through ignorance and as he is now willing to serve, that he be in consequence be exempted to a fine, and that a new election be directed to take place for that township." (Wellington District Council Minute Books).

Hunter was again chosen by the Glenelg electors and presented himself at the next session of Council in October. Meanwhile, at the February meeting, Hunter's counterpart from the adjoining Township of Bentinck had asked leave to bring in a by-law to divide the joint townships of Bentinck and Glenelg into three Union School Sections, a request complied with at that same session.

The District Council governed all aspects of municipal affairs including education and taxes. In October of 1848, they appointed Milton C. Schofield, the first postmaster in the area, to be road surveyor for the Townships of Glenelg, Bentinck, Egremont and Normanby. Public health was another responsibility of the Council and in July, 1849, they named a local Board of Health for Glenelg and Bentinck, consisting of Messrs. Stewart, Thomas Brown, James Jamieson, Alex'r Hunter and Robert Douglas. This action was likely prompted by an outbreak of typhoid throughout the province that summer.

In December, 1847, the District Council granted licenses to two taverns in the vicinity of Glenelg; to Archibald Hunter in Durham and to Charles Davis in Bentinck. These were not necessarily the only taverns in the area, just the only legal establishments.

Archibald Hunter served two years as District Councillor and was supplanted by Alex B. McNab, elected for 1850. McNab's political initiation was marred by controversy in that "Mr. Edge and others" from the Township of Glenelg presented a petition declaring that McNab's name was not on the assessment list as a freehold landowner in the township or the County and therefore that he was not able legally to sit as Councillor for Glenelg.

George Jackson, Crown Land Agent at Durham and newly elected Councillor from Bentinck defended his colleague, pointing out that McNab's name was omitted in error from the assessment rolls and he had receipts to prove he had paid his taxes. McNab was the first reeve of Glenelg and headed a council formed as a result of the Municipal Act of 1849, composed of James Ledingham, Allan Cameron, Donald McCormick and Duncan Smith.

MARRIAGE REGISTERS

"While researching at the Ontario Archives this past Saturday (26 Jan. 1986), I came upon a source which I feel should be brought to the attention of the readers of the newsletter of the Bruce & Grey Branch of O.G.S.

The SIMCOE COUNTY MARRIAGE REGISTER 1842-1858 (M5 248 Reel 14 – see self-serve cabinet 6, reel 481) contains between 50 and 75 marriages performed in the townships of St. Vincent, Euphrasia and Artemesia during the 1840's. Many of these marriages were performed by the itinerate Wesleyan Methodist missionary Rev. John Neelands. The register provides the names of the bride and groom, their township of residences and/or the township in which the ceremony took place, the date of the ceremony, whether the marriage was by license or publication of banns, the names of two witnesses and the name and religious affiliation of the presiding clergyman. There is also a surname index.

I found recorded in this register the marriage performed at Vail's Point in 1848 of my great-great-grandparents John Lemon and Olivia Kirvan. I also found the name of witnesses to several other St. Vincent marriages to be most revealing.

In light of the fact that source material for the 1840's is so scarce, any researcher working on families living in these three townships in this period should definitely check these registers."



The 25th anniversary of the O.G.S. was held in Bruce County Museum Saturday, April 19. The event was sponsored by Bruce-Grey Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society.

Kenneth Young, in charge of genealogical research for the L.D.S. church in Owen Sound, was the speaker for the 10:45 session. Kenneth pleased the audience with his novel approach, "To Beginning Genealogy."

Stewart Stark, Southampton, told of his search for his U.E.L. ancestors in the Mohawk Valley. Stark also had set up an excellent display of army material.

Dr. Elizabeth Ervan, Professor of History, University of Western Ontario, "The place of women in Medieval Scotland." Many marriages were arranged by the parents but many women would run away from such planning. Women did play a part in the business of the family.

Brian Gilchrist, one of Canada's most gifted genealogists, spoke on the use of newspapers in genealogical research. Brian's ancestors were natives of Bruce County and is well acquainted with the local newspapers. In 1898 there were 3,500 newspapers published in Ontario. Today many are amalgamated by one publisher. Brian told the audience that newspapers are the greatest source of research for births, marriages, deaths. At the turn of the century, many from this area went west - - get papers from the western provinces to follow up the generation in the west.

Bankruptcy is not only typical of 1986, but newspapers reveal many in 1870 and again in 1930.

Many people committed suicide, which was common in the Niagara Falls and Kingston area. The papers also told of vagabonds, thieves and people running away and never returning.

"Look out for you own local area, but also area papers, libraries and relatives" said Brian.

Audrey Underwood, R.R. 2, Port Elgin, and Judith Mitten, Waterloo, were nominated for regional director of Region 3 of the Genealogical Society in Ontario. A vote of the people present, Audrey Underwood was declared director. The region consists of Perth, Grey-Bruce, Wellington, Waterloo. The regional secretary is Jim McCallum, Perth County.

The local Bruce-Grey Society have as their president, Betty Siegrist of Wiarton, secretary, Morna Hoskins, R.R. 3, Chatsworth and treasurer, Tom Murray, Owen Sound.

Birthday cake and coffee was served to celebrate the 25th anniversary.

A large display of Bruce County histories and publications were for sale, also, Attic Books, London had several rare publications.

Mary Ann Neville, editor of "A History of Glenelg Township" (Bruce & Grey newsletter, volume 16, #1, Feb. 1986, page 5) was guest speaker at the May meeting held in the old Glenelg Twp. Hall.

It was an experience just trying to find the place. Fortunately for long bright evenings and beautiful scenery, there was no panic when we were "slightly" lost or had driven a number of miles out of our way. Last year we had Lamlash to find, this Glenegl Centre, next year we will try another hamlet. Our purpose is to show the beauty of our two counties.

Miss Neville illustrated her talk with a slide presentation. Two I was particularly interested in – Hunter's British Hotel and the home of George Jackson, the first crown land agent. Both people are mentioned many times by people coming up the Garafraxa road.

The British Hotel was built by Archibald Hunter in 1854 and was the usual stopping place for settlers coming into the area. Some refer to it as Hunter's Hotel. It was built of stone & still stands as an apartment house on the hill at the north end of Durham. It is on the east side of the road (Hwy. #6) with a church (now closed) on its north side. At one time the church was part of the hotel complex. The home of George Jackson is across the road and a short distance farther north. It sits back from the road surrounded by a large lot and is presently listed for sale.



Family will receive friends at the Tanner and Pearson Funeral Home, Walkerton, after 7:00 p.m. this evening, where funeral service will be held on Sunday at 2:00 p.m. Rev. Fred Neill officiating. Interment in Chesley Cemetery. Memorial donations to the charity of your choice gratefully acknowledged as expressions of sympathy. Royal Canadian Legion Service will be held at the funeral home Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m.

On the 6th Nov. 1985, the Walkerton Herald-Times published an interview with Russell. An edited version follows –

"... He was serving with the British Royal Air Force as a radar technician in the Malay Penninsula when Japan entered the war in December 1941.

Early in 1942 he was taken prisoner along with thousands of others. With the passage of time, his memories of these days have faded a bit, but he has vivid recollections of some of his experiences.

An afternoon spent listening to realities about the horrors of war makes one reconsider the life we have today.

Adolph was stationed in Singapore at the time war broke out. As the Japs got closer, he and his fellow service men tried to get away on a boat. By the third night they had finally gotten off the island and were running toward Java. He says they would sail during the night and camoflauge the boat with whatever they could find in among the islands during the day.

He remembers on morning when, "We heard this roar in the sky. It was a squadron of Jap bombers. The bombers were heading to Samatra, but thought we were a better target and started bombing us. The captain couldn't get the anchor up. It was caught somehow. We were going around in circles at full speed. The Japs were firing at us now. They blew the bridge off the boat and put holes all over. All the men ran down to get in the hold and my life belt got caught on the way down so I was the last down. It was so crowded down there I couldn't even crouch.

"I said to myself, if I'm going to die, I'm going to die up top in the fresh air.

"We made the boat get us to an island, but because the bridge had been blown off, directions to steer the boat were passed down a line of men from the front to the back. We let it sink as soon as we got off. That's how bad it was.

"We didn't know how close the Japs were getting to us. We received orders to assemble at an aerodrome. There were about 1,000 of us altogether.

"As we stood in formation, Jap bombers and fighters passed overhead, coming down closer every time. One guy couldn't take it and ran toward the jungle. At this, the commander called out to all of us, 'If we're going to die, we'll stand here and die like English gentlemen'".

Adolph was a prisoner of war until it ended in 1945. His memories of the POW camp centre of the deaths of his comrades who fell victim to diseases like malaria and dysentery. Adolph contracted malaria and at one point he was placed on the bed of a buddy who had just died. It was assumed Adolph would also die.

"When the Jap commander told us the war was over, I just wasn't sure I believed it or not. Some of the guvs went batty."

Adolph has no problems remembering the details of his trip home.

"When I got of the train in Chesley, everybody in the community was gathered there. It was about noon time. The kids got a holiday from school, the factories shut down for a while and everyone came out to welcome me."

At the recent meeting of the Bruce & Grey Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society held in Wiarton Louise Robertson gave an interesting talk on her experiences in hunting for her ancestors in England. She had access to scrapbooks, old trunks, letters and diaries which carried her back to 1765. On a trip to England in 1953, she traced her Gay family of Aldborough Hall, Norfolk back to 1500 and then later back to 1350, in Bury St. Edmonds in Suffolk there were records back to 1640 on the Maltyward branch. On further trips in 1976 and more recently she researched in Sussex on the Covert family who date back to 1066 and William the Conqueror, also compiling a list of properties owned by them. She had many pictures, books and documents which she has obtained through the years. It was an inspiration to the rest of us who are struggling away trying to dig up information on our roots.

Early in 1986 Frank Weaver of Owen Sound received his United Empire Loyalist certificate and is now a member of the Grand River branch of the United Empire Loyalist Association of Canada. During the course of his research into the Seaman family history (Mary Ann Seaman was his paternal grandmother) it was discovered that four of his ancestors had received land grants in Upper Canada following the Revolutionary War. These were Seaman, Mallory, Brisbin and McCready.

The application for U.E. status was through David McCready who took up land in Elizabethtown in the Johnstown District (now Leeds County) in 1795. His daughter Margaret who received 200 acres was married to Nehemiah Seaman. After he drowned in the St. Lawrence River in 1830, she married Dr. Peter Howard of Brockville. Widowed again, she moved to Owen Sound to be near her children; (1) Eliza Ann, Mrs. Hiram Kilbourn and later Mrs. W .C. Boyd; (2) Mary Ann, Mrs. Ebenezer Kyle and later Mrs. John Gurthrie; (3) David married Hulda Keeler Mallory and had taken up land in St. Vincent in 1835. Margaret McCready Seaman Howard died in Owen Sound in 1853.

The Seamans were early settlers of Long Island, New York having arrived in America with the Winthrop expedition.

Both David McCready and his wife Katherine Donnan were born in Wigtonshire, Scotland.

Selected Passages from – AN INTRODUCTION TO LAND REGISTRATION, WHAT IT IS – WHY IT IS – WHAT IT IS BECOMING

Land, a finite resource, is the ultimate foundation on which is built any successful socioeconomic system. Unlike personal property, it cannot be transported physically from one place to another.

The purpose of all land registration systems is to provide a record of the benefits and burdens which are attached to the ownership of land.

Land is everlasting, in the legal sense, and therefore may be the subject of all kinds of future interests both beneficial and burdensome.

Our land registry system has evolved to satisfy both private and public functions. Thus it provides the individual with a record of the rights and duties which attach to a given parcel of land, and the state with an inventory of the provincial land resource. Land Registrars enforce the province's land and title registration statutes, collects all fees due to the province and generally manage the day-to-day operations of the system.

In Upper Canada in 1792 the crown, Governor Simcoe, undertook the task of determining who was sitting where in what is now called Ontario. Surveyors mapped and divided it into counties; the counties were divided into townships, the townships into concessions, the concessions into lots. In urban areas, town plans or subdivisions were created.

(Ed.'s note: Somewhere the division into DISTRICTS has been omitted from the above passage).

What might be looked upon as the beginning of the modern era insofar as Ontario is concerned, began with the Registry Act of 1795.

In 1865 the system was changed by the Registrar of Deeds for Ontario County, John Ham Perry, to one based on a geographical rather than an alphabetical listing. This is considered by some authorities to be one of the most significant changes ever made to the registry system. Under the new system, notice filing was discontinued and the original instruments had to be registered to protect one's priority over other dealings with the same land. Compared to other jurisdictions, Ontario's registry system is considered extremely good.

The Custody of Titles Deeds Act, passed in 1887, later the Custody of Documents Act, and now Part II of the Registry Act, was another significant step in the evolution of laws governing the

transfer of lands. It's most obvious purpose was, and is, to provide for the deposit in Registry Offices of original deeds and other instruments previously registered under memorials.

When land is sold in Ontario, the purchaser's solicitor examines the records in the Land Registry Office to determine who holds the rights to a given piece of property. When real property is used as collateral, the debt is attached to the property, and the individual.

Under the Registry Act this information is found in the abstract index book, which contains the records from the latest transaction back to the original Crown patent.

A solicitor must establish a forty year chain of title to the land in question, and usually checks those parcels of land abutting it for overlap, or encroachment and for compliance with the Planning Act.

Assuming the chain of title is good and there are no debts attached to the land, such as mortgages, construction liens, claims for security interest under Personal Property Security Act, or executions, the new transaction is registered and the document then has priority over any subsequently registered documents affecting the land.

This transaction is entered on the fee sheet, and then the appropriate title record book. Before filing, all documents are microfilmed in numerical order of receipt, so that duplicates can be made in case of fire, theft or loss.

In the late 1960's the Law Reform Commission began to study the system. They recommended that the land records be computerized. A prototype office was set up in Woodstock in 1984. Over the next few years, automation will take over the other Registry Offices in Ont. Another feature of the new system will be that the public will view the documents on microfilm instead of being given the original paper documents.

The project has been called POLARIS, Province of Ontario Land Registration Information System. Its purpose is the eventual replacement of the paper abstract indexes and parcel registers with computer-generated indexes. Access to the video display terminal will not require a computer background for using them.

Just as all things change, all things remain essentially the same. The function of the Registry Office - - that of providing information on who owns what rights to a given piece of land (real property) and to establish priority and therefore security to the new holder of rights - - remains the same, just as it did when the Registry Act of 1795 was instituted.

About this time, the writer was told, a story of a local lawyer went the rounds; it bears retelling. It seems he had frequent visitors, many of whom remarked on a silver spoon which hung in a prominent spot. When asked about its origin, the lawyer explained: - "About three months ago I Defended Mr. - - - of theft. He was accused of stealing a quantity of things from a fashionable house. Part of his loot was a set of sterling silver . . . Well, I believed his story and won his acquittal. He had no money at the time to pay me. Later he mailed me that spoon. It was part of the set he was accused of stealing. I keep it there to remind myself not to believe everybody's story."

Summertime enhanced most sports. Horse racing brought visitors from the greatest distance. The time of 2.29 for the 2.24 class; and half mile heats had become an almost weekly event.

The Pottawatomie Wind Dodgers lacrosse team was made up of Bob Cruickshanks, Russ Hare, John and Dan McGregor, Tom Grady, Bill Young and Jim Kennedy . . . The Rough Riders included Harry Stewart, Doug and Gray Hay, Blaine and Charles Redfern, Vincent Gordon and Horace Brown. Competition was prolonged and fierce at times.

June saw the new bunkhouse at the C.P.R. completed on the docks. It was a spot for the firemen, engineers who did not live in Town, and others for relaxing. A coal dock was newly built

on the west side for the CITY OF OWEN SOUND. When 530 tons of coal were unloaded later, the residents on 1st avenue west, north of tenth were loud in complaints about the heavy dust.

Sixty percent of the C.P.R. track men were out on strike, when a broken springboard cause a derailment. Tempers were short. The men who controlled the interests of the Town did not too often seem to stoop to lend a hand to those in less fortunate circumstances. The House of Refuge was three long years into the future.

But the names of those who aspired to higher levels of politics, and the names of those influential enough to support them, are of vital interest.

A quilt made prior to 1854, marriage vows dated 1814, an 1888 marriage certificate, letters dating back to 1844 were among some of the mementos displayed by 88 yr. old Mrs. Alice (Milburn) Floyd at the Bruce & Grey Branch O.G.S. meeting and potluck supper held in the old school house in Scone.

Mrs. Floyd's family, the Milburns, were the first settlers at Peabody, her husband's family being among the first at Scone. These mementos have been family heirlooms. She has also

collected a number of scrapbooks in her family history research. Mrs. Floyd wrote the History of Scone.

Olive McLaughlin gave an example of how she interests children in genealogy. She has a clock, bought in 1862, and this past year they gave it a birthday party. It is still in good running condition and the children were allowed to wind it and have their pictures taken with it. Olive also reported on Dr. Robert Norman's speech on Genetics from the Seminar '86 in Windsor. Dr. Norman feels it is important to know cause of death of our ancestors as genes are inherited.

Other reports from the Seminar included Audrey Underwood on Joy Reisinger, author of the newsletter, Lost in Canada? and on William Filby, editor of seven volumes of ships lists, which are in the Archives in Southampton Museum.

Gladys Arnold, who received awards from Ministry of Citizenship and Culture and the O.G.S. of which she is a charter member, was presented with an O.G.S. silver anniversary letter opener from the Bruce & Grey Branch.

Aileen McDearmid spoke on Simon T. Roe, one of the early settlers of Paisley, who built a tavern in 1851 which is now the Paisley Inn. Mr. Roe was also the first reeve of Elderslie Township.

Mabel Thaler spoke on humanity of our ancestors.

DAYS OF THE "MUD MEN"

Years of Settlement

Settlement of the four northern townships of the Bruce Peninsula started following the survey of Albemarle Township, which began in 1855.

The first settlers in Albemarle took up land to the north of Colpoy's Bay in 1857; John Wood and Samuel Atkinson (Lots 30, 31 Con. 8 EBR). In May, 1858, five families came: Rev. Ludwick Kribs, Caleb Spragge, Ludwick Spragge, Henry Kribs and Joseph Stringer. The latter two men perished late in 1858 in a storm while carrying supplies by sailboat from Owen Sound.

Another early settler, William Bull, was the Indian Lands Agent in this area and sold a good many acres of land for the Crown Lands Department in Ottawa. Prices were very cheap. Henry Whicher brought approximately 300 acres of land at three dollars per acre (see Henry Whicher's Diary). All these old pioneers are buried in the Colpoy's Bay cemetery.

The Township's trading soon came to be focused on the settlement of Colpoy's Bay with the early establishment of saw and grist mills and the opening of the post office in 1863.

It is interesting to note that the settlement of Colpoy's Bay, named after Sir John Colpoy, an admiral in the British navy, preceded that of Wiarton by ten years. The total population of the Township of Albemarle in 1861 was 54 souls. By 1871 it had risen to 678.

Wiarton's first settler arrived in 1866 and the post office was opened there in 1868. With the opening of wharf facilities in 1868 where grain could be marketed, Wiarton soon outgrew the older settlement of Colpoy's Bay. The establishment of the railhead of the Grand Trunk Railroad in 1881 left no doubt as to Wiarton's dominance of the area. (See Railway by C.H. Whicher.)

Albemarle's earliest road followed the town line between Amabel and Albemarle and thence north to Mar and the Township of Eastnor, Highway #6 today.

Naturally the early settlers followed this road, so after Colpoy's Bay was settled, the next lands to be occupied extended along the road from the Amabel boundary north to Mar in the centre of the Township.

Another early settlement in Albemarle was located in the vicinity of Purple Valley.

It is difficult to believe that such an arrangement could exist, but so the story went. The Catholics felt that the Methodists were not carrying their share of the burden of the expenses and were using too much wood. How did it end? It was said that someone set fire to the church and it burned to the ground."



This is a time for looking back. As I looked through the old newsletters, I came across the following by the late Delene Sampson – "I visited a woman who gave me help in eliminating a branch that I though might be mine. When I wrote to thank her I asked her a further question or two and

received a reply that 'shook' me.

'There are so many nice hobbies such as crocheting, knitting and other crafts which would be more rewarding than unattainable family history (especially since you have your family roots back to the time they came to Canada). I certainly would not like to hear of your having a nervous break-down over this."!!!!!

I squirmed uncomfortably when I received her letter, wondering what I could have said to give her the impression I might be on the way to a nervous break-down. However I can laugh at it now." Delene adds, "Your editor know the anonymous lady who sent this joke on herself and knows she is an accomplished knitter and crocheter"

We have to remember that not everyone loves us for working on a family history.

As dusk fell, the narrow country roads were busy with traffic. Trucks wheezed and grunted,

As dusk fell, the narrow country roads were busy with traffic. Trucks wheezed and grunted, beneath their loads of furniture and family treasures. Women drove cattle out of familiar pastures and headed southward. There was a sense of urgency, of haste.

Morning came and guns boomed from swift-moving, modern mammoth-tanks. They tore past deserted farms and across fields recently lush with the bounty of harvest.

It was a picture familiar in many lands. War had come to another rural country-side, this time in Canada.

Wednesday evening, the northern tip of Sydenham and St. Vincent Townships were farming areas. Thursday morning they were a new Canadian Active Army Tank Range:: Owen Sound Sun Times 1 Oct. 1942.

When the Meaford Express carried the startling report 9 July 1942, 106 families had little time to ponder their fate before the gov't took over the area we now call the "Tank Range". Bruce & Grey Branch Newsletter, Vol. 11, #5, page 53.

At our Branch meeting in Sept. at Meaford Town Hall, we relived the above eviction with Marjorie M. Davison and her success in opening the door for a reunion on the range to celebrate Ontario's 200th birthday.

The reunion was a huge success. As a permanent record, Marjorie wrote ST. VINCENT -THE TREE WITH THE BROKEN BRANCH. As she says, the expropriation of the land for a military base was a happening from which the township never fully recovered. It was left slightly crippled, thus, the explanation for the title of the book.

It was in October 1981 when our Branch last met in Dundalk. Once again our hostess was Audrey Clarke, clerk-treasurer of the Municipality. This time in the refurbished town hall. Audrey's work can be reviewed in Volume 11, #1, p. 7 and Volume 11, #5, p. 46.

Audrey had the National Film Board's presentation on film of their story of the life of Agnes McPhail. She feels that it does not do justice to the important role that this woman played in making many needed reforms in our government systems. The first woman M.P. was remembered by a number at the meeting.

On page 43 is the biographical account of Miss MacPhail as published in the new Artemesia historv.

AGNES CAMPBELL MACPHAIL

Artemesia Township, being a part of South-Grey, is very proud to have had the honour of sending the first woman to be elected in Canada to the House of Commons, namely Agnes C. Macphail (1890-1954). She was the daughter of Dougal and Henrietta (Campbell) Macphail. She spent the first twelve years of her life in Proton Township where she was born. In 1902 her parents moved to the farm in Artemesia to lot 17, Con. 3 with their family of three daughters, Agnes, Gertha (Mrs. Meredith Reany) and Lilly (Mrs. Hugh Bailey). Here she attended S.S. #17 (Old Durham Road) elementary school. Then she went to Owen Sound Collegiate. After attending for two years, she graduated and went to Stratford Normal School. Her first school was at Gowanlocks near Port Elgin at a yearly salary of \$500.00 paid in four installments. Her later schools were Kinloss (between Walkerton and Kincardine) then Oyen in Alberta, and Boothville in Egremont Township. Her last school before entering politics was near Sharon, about 40 miles from Toronto.

It was here that she discovered her outstanding ability to speak about controversial issues. She supported a strong political movement for farmers. She returned to Grey County where she won the nomination as a candidate in South Grey representing the (Progressive Party) United Farmers of Ontario. She won the election on December 6, 1921 at the age of 31. In parliament she fought for her ideas with strength and determination. She was known for her sense of social justice and her support for such causes as prison reform, international cooperation, improvements of rural life and a wider participation by women in public life.

After spending 19 years as a member of parliament she was defeated on March 24, 1940. She was elected in two separate elections as a C.C.F. member in the Ontario Legislature. When her doctors warned her to slow down she replied. "So I don't live long. But I'll live what's left, doing what I want to do." She died following a heart attack in a Toronto hospital on Feb. 15, 1954. She was buried in the family plot in McNeil Cemetery, Priceville in one of the worst winter storms of the year.

A bronze bust of her stands near the Speaker's Chambers in the House of Commons, Ottawa.

A plaque honouring her memory is erected in the Proton Township Centennial Park in Hopeville. Three Ontario schools have been named in her honour, Macphail Memorial Elementary School, Flesherton, A Girl's Vocational School in Hamilton and the Agnes Macphail Public School in the Borough of Scarborough, opened in April 1982.

The Grey County Women's Institutes established an Agnes Macphail award in 1958 to Institute members. Recognition is given on the basis of volunteer work in the community as well as within the confines of the Institute.

To Artemesia residents, Agnes was a friend welcomed into the home, someone to be remembered for her sincerity, ability, kindness and not least, her sense of humour.

She was one of the first Canadians to be presented to King George and Queen Elizabeth.

Dear Betty

The excitement is beginning to settle down to ordinary living. We had Willie McLean of Lewis Isle staying with John C. and Mary McDonald's for two weeks. When Dorie (John C) and Mary were in Lewis in 1985, Willie was their tour guide. Jack found out he was a second cousin of his father, known as Dan S. McDonald. Willie was in Canada visiting his daughter in Oakville and planned to visit Dorie and Mary for a few days but was persuaded to stay two weeks. Folks became very fond of this quiet, knowledgeable man.

Then came the long-awaited visit of Bill Lawson, now of Harris but formerly of Lewis. Bill arrived on Oct. 8th in time to speak at a gathering of interested people in the Legion Hall, Ripley. At this meeting were representatives of various McDonald families – Dories, Yarrys, Colins, Farmers, Kelpers as well as Gillies, McPhail, McLeod, Smith, McGregor. I don't remember a McLay or McIver but there are intermarried with the others. A few were present whose ancestors came from mainland Scotland and a couple came from Brantford whose ancestors came from Lewis to the Eastern Townships. Bill told of the various migrations and where the Bruce County folks had lived.

In the evening, Bill Lawson showed slides of Lewis and gave a good picture of life on the Isle. Willie McLean was able to add bits of information. The meeting ended with a real ceilidh (cayley) with folks telling Scottish stories.

Bill also talked to people privately. They gave him their family trees so that he hopes to have a fairly comprehensive story of the Lewis families who came to Bruce by next year. He showed slides of Harris to the Senior Citizens on the 10th and to 3 groups of school children on the 14th.

On Oct. 15th a Pot Luck Supper in the Legion Hall completed the meetings in Ripley. It is amazing the information a group of people can provide and have a good time as well. Bill reported he has 73 families completed out of the 109 who came to Bruce but has much to do in assembling it. It is also hoped information can be found on the remaining families.

Beth Clarke and Mrs. Birch who had query #13 in the Sept. newsletter drove from Mississauga to interview Bill on the 15th.

(Bill Lawson visited Owen Sound and Lion's Head on the 12th and 13th).

Bill reported that when the two boats were loading at Stornway, Isle of Lewis, in 1852, the people were from Barvae and nearby parishes some were from Ness but there was a type of fever there. The ones on the boats said. "If they come from Ness, we get off." So recruits were found near Stornway to fill the boats.

The name McLay was spelled McLeay in Lewis.

Bill Lawson is now working on genealogy full-time. Do not know his fee schedule. His address is – Bill Lawson, The Old School House, Northon, Isle of Harris, Scotland.

Bill Lawson is not a mountie, but he'll go to any length to get his man.

The Scottish genealogist has spent the last week in Ripley and Huron Township tracking down "dead ends".

In the past 32 years, he has compiled over 16,000 genealogies of the people of the outer islands (mainly the Isles of Lewis and Harris). Most of the family trees start in the 1750's and continue up to the present. However, in many genealogies, Lawson came to the point where families simply disappeared.

Many of those families ended up in Canada. In the 1810-1820 period, they went to Cape Breton Island, in the 1840's to the Eastern Townships of Quebec, in 1851 and 1863 to Bruce County and in the 1870's to Manitoba.

Lawson estimates that a third of the population of the islands, perhaps 20,000 people, came to Canada in the 1800's.

He's in Ripley to do what he has already done in Cape Breton and Quebec – match families here with the ones back home on the Isle of Lewis. Although the task looks formidable to the novice (for example, 24 families of MacDonalds from the Isle of Lewis settled in Huron in 1852), Lawson says 90 per cent of the families can be matched.

The people of the islands still speak Gaelic, a language that Lawson says oozes family history. For example, an islander will be referred to as John, the son of, the son of and so on. If Lawson knows the first names of the generation that emigrated, he can match that family with the branch that remained on the island.

He met descendants of the Lewis settlers Thursday afternoon at the Ripley Legion and, hopefully with the sponsorship of the Ontario Genealogical Society, will be able to publish a Register of Immigrants for Huron Township. It looks as if he'll be able to complete the register by next summer and when it is, it will be forwarded to Gladys Arter by next summer and forward it to Gladys Arnold of Ripley, a keen genealogist.

A LABOUR OF LOVE

Lawson, who grew up on the "mainland', fell for the islands during a visit 32 years ago when he was still a university student.

And what started out as a hobby has now grown into a full-time job for Lawson. He is a lawyer and surveyor by profession and at one time taught law to surveyors. More recently, he was in charge of a development project on crofting and fishing in the islands. That allowed him to move to the islands five years ago. When he finished that job, he went into the genealogy business on a full-time basis.

The islands are 25 to 30 miles off mainland Scotland and are one of the few places where the old story telling traditions remain strong.

He says people started leaving the islands in the early part of the last century when the bottom fell out of the seaweed trade. From 1820 on, the lands cleared of crofters to allow for large sheep farms, which meant more emigration. In the 1880's, with the control of childhood diseases, families became too large which kept the exodus alive.

The land on the islands is also poor which means that children have always had to leave, says Lawson.

Ironically, the island is now much like it was back in the early 1800's. Australian and New Zealand farmers ended the sheep trade after the 1890's. When the large farms went bankrupt, the government bought the land and broke the large farms back into crofts. That continued up to the 1930's.

People still can't make a living on the small crofts, five to six acres in size, and as a result most crofters also have another source of income. Besides, it is dangerous to rely on farming. The islands are as far north as Churchill, Manitoba and farmers are at the mercy of the weather.

The isles of Lewis and Harris have a population today of 25,000.

Lawson and William MacLean, a third cousin of John C. MacDonald, have been staying at the MacDonald home in Ripley.

Lawson "kidnapped" John and his wife Mary from a tour of Scotland there were on a year ago and took them to the Isle of Lewis to meet John's cousin, Mr. MacLean, who then introduced John and Mary to more relatives.

While Lawson can't visually recognize the descendants of the pioneers to Huron, he says that MacLean can look at some of the people and tell which family they belong to.

As for Lawson, his job may never de done. While in the area, he has taken side trips to Owen Sound and Middlesex County for more information on settlers from the isles and there are still other pockets of Lewis settlers around.

Borrow a pot from a neighbour. Boil in pot over a fire outdoors. When the neighbours phone to complain about the smell, it is done.

This dish eats like meat & tastes like fish.

Bill says it is an acquired taste. Oh yes, you borrow the pot because you can't get rid of the smell. Also says matured means that the guga is allowed to sit for several days after it has been killed.

Mr. & Mrs. McFarlane have come to serve in Lucknow United Church. They previously served in the Eastern Townships of Que. and in the Gaspe among people of Scottish descent. They said that when Britain was clearing their jails of criminals, many in jail for only minor offences, Scotland sent some of theirs to the Gaspe. These people did not want to be found so changed their name to a common one such as Campbell.

The value of copying old church records was impressed on me recently. A woman from Auburn with her cousin from S. Carolina came here seeking info. on George Henry Free. Nothing in any history or directory although on thought her father was born in Huron Twp. in 1897. The gdm. was Victoria Pollock, a sis. of Sidney on #9 Hwy. near Kinloss. We looked in Bervie Anglican Church Records & found Geo. H. Free's marriage, baptism of 4 children & that he lived on rented land in Kincardine Twp., 2 locations, in Huron Twp. and ended up in Ashfield Twp., Huron County.
